An act of performing a dramatic role, song, or piece of music.  
*Bailey gives a sound **performance** as the doctor.*

Put in effect.

*The planes **accomplished** their mission.*

### achieve

Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage.

*He **achieved** his ambition to become a press photographer.*

### attain

Reach a point in time, or a certain state or level.

*Clarify your objectives and ways of **attaining** them.*

### clinch

Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot.

*The Texan wanted to impress him to **clinch** a business deal.*

### consensus

Agreement in the judgment or opinion reached by a group as a whole.

*A **consensus** view.*

### content

The state of being contented with your situation in life.

*He **contented** himself with one glass of beer per day.*

<b>efficiently</b>	In a well-organized and competent way. <i>It is essential to make sure businesses operate <b>efficiently</b> to maximize profits.</i>
<b>execution</b>	The act of accomplishing some aim or executing some order. <i>The film is entirely professional in its <b>execution</b>.</i>
<b>fill</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The next few days were <b>filled</b> with meetings.</i>
<b>firmness</b>	The property of being unyielding to the touch. <i>The <b>firmness</b> of his hand on my chest.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Fill, satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
<b>fulfillment</b>	A feeling of satisfaction at having achieved your desires.
<b>goal</b>	A cage or basket used as a goal in other sports. <i>The aircraft bumped towards our <b>goal</b> some 400 miles to the west.</i>
<b>imposition</b>	A tax or duty. <i>He listened but resented the <b>imposition</b>.</i>
<b>indulging</b>	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
<b>infliction</b>	The action of inflicting something unpleasant or painful on someone or something. <i>What an <b>infliction</b> he must be.</i>
<b>injunction</b>	An authoritative warning or order. <i><b>Injunction</b> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>mission</b>	A group of people sent on a mission. <i>A confidential <b>mission</b> to London.</i>
<b>practice</b>	Carry out or practice as of jobs and professions. <i>It must have taken a lot of <b>practice</b> to become so fluent.</i>
<b>process</b>	An instance of a program being executed in a multitasking operating system typically running in an environment that protects it from other processes. <i><b>Process</b> iron.</i>
<b>resolution</b>	The number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>A successful <b>resolution</b> to the problem.</i>

<b><u>revel</u></b>	Get great pleasure from (a situation or experience). <i>Bill said he was secretly <b>revelling</b> in his new found fame.</i>
<b>satisfaction</b>	Christ's atonement for sin. <i>We were unable to get <b>satisfaction</b> from the local store.</i>
<b>satisfactorily</b>	In a satisfactory manner. <i>The plan has not worked <b>satisfactorily</b>.</i>
<b>successfully</b>	With success; in a successful manner. <i>She has <b>successfully</b> completed her mission.</i>
<b>task</b>	Assign a task to. <i>I <b>tasked</b> him with looking after the children.</i>
<b><u>triumph</u></b>	The processional entry of a victorious general into ancient Rome. <i>The king returned home in <b>triumph</b>.</i>
<b>turnkey</b>	A jailer. <i><b>Turnkey</b> systems for telecommunications customers.</i>
