affect Connect closely and often incriminatingly.
*The dampness began to **affect** my health.*

<u>affiliated</u>	(of a subsidiary group or a person) officially attached or connected to an organization. <i>Microsoft and its affiliated companies.</i>
appertain	Be a part or attribute of. <i>The answers generally appertain to improvements in standard of service.</i>
attached	(of an organization) affiliated to (a larger organization). <i>All art schools whether independent or attached to universities.</i>
concerned	Involved in or affected by or having a claim to or share in. <i>Greatly concerned not to disappoint a small child.</i>
connate	(of parts) united so as to form a single part. <i>Connate qualities.</i>
consanguinity	The fact of being descended from the same ancestor. <i>The marriage was annulled on grounds of consanguinity.</i>
<u>correlated</u>	Mutually related.
correlation	A statistic representing how closely two variables co vary it can vary from 1 perfect negative correlation through 0 no correlation to 1 perfect positive correlation. <i>The increasingly similar basis underlying national soil maps allows correlation to take place more easily.</i>
correlative	A word or concept that has a mutual relationship with another word or concept. <i>Rights whether moral or legal can involve correlative duties.</i>
<u>enclosed</u>	Closed in or surrounded or included within. <i>A dark enclosed space.</i>
factually	As a fact or based on fact. <i>His assertion is factually incorrect.</i>
genetically	In a way that relates to origin or development. <i>Hair colour is genetically determined.</i>
guesswork	An estimate based on little or no information. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of guesswork.</i>
included	Contained as part of a whole being considered. <i>All of Europe Britain included.</i>
<u>indirectly</u>	Without having had direct experience; at second hand. <i>Both writers refer if only indirectly to a wealth of other art.</i>

interested	Showing curiosity or concern about something or someone; having a feeling of interest. <i>I had always been interested in history.</i>
interrelationship	Mutual or reciprocal relation or relatedness. <i>Interrelationships of animal structure and function.</i>
involved	Emotionally involved. <i>The plot was too involved.</i>
kin	A person having kinship with another or others. <i>He was kin to the brothers.</i>
kindred	Similar in quality or character. <i>Books on kindred subjects.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
paternal	Related through the father. <i>He reasserted his paternal authority.</i>
pertain	Be in effect or existence in a specified place or at a specified time. <i>The shop premises and stock and all assets pertaining to the business.</i>
positively	In a positive way, especially by expressing optimism, agreement, or acceptance. <i>This is positively the last word on the matter.</i>
referent	Something that refers; a term that refers to another term. <i>Judgments referent to the indictment.</i>
relate	Feel sympathy for or identify with. <i>The new legislation related to corporate activities.</i>
related	Being connected either logically or causally or by shared characteristics. <i>Related to micelle formation is the ability of detergent actives to congregate at oil water interfaces.</i>
relevancy	The relation of something to the matter at hand.
subjectivity	The quality of existing in someone's mind rather than the external world. <i>He is the first to acknowledge the subjectivity of memories.</i>
