complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>The restoration of the chapel is complete.</i>
deducible	Capable of being deduced.
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>An ideological system with which he is in entire agreement.</i>
implied	Suggested but not directly expressed; implicit. <i>She was aware of his implied criticism.</i>
inbuilt	Existing as an essential constituent or characteristic. <i>The body s inbuilt ability to heal itself.</i>

inexplicit	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something. <i>Inexplicit declarations.</i>
<u>inherent</u>	In the nature of something though not readily apparent. <i>Any form of mountaineering has its inherent dangers.</i>
inseparable	Not capable of being separated. <i>Research and higher education seem inseparable.</i>
<u>intrinsic</u>	Belonging to a thing by its very nature. <i>Form was treated as something intrinsic as the very essence of the thing.</i>
latent	Not presently active. <i>Axillary buds or eyes in the leaf axils are latent growth buds.</i>
perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>Life certainly isn t perfect at the moment.</i>
<u>sheer</u>	(of a fabric) very thin; diaphanous. <i>A sheer descent of rock.</i>

<u>total</u>	Comprising the whole number or amount. <i>A total eclipse.</i>
<u>underlying</u>	Located beneath or below. <i>The underlying muscles of the face.</i>
<u>understood</u>	Implied by or inferred from actions or statements. <i>The understood provisos of a custody agreement.</i>
<u>unquestioning</u>	Not inclined to ask questions. <i>An unquestioning acceptance of the traditional curriculum.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Utter seriousness.</i>
<u>wholehearted</u>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Gave wholehearted support to her candidacy.</i>

<u>imply</u>	Suggest as a logically necessary consequence; in logic. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i>

include	Specifically exclude someone from a group or activity. <i>We must include this chemical element in the group.</i>
inclusion	A person or thing that is included within a whole. <i>The exhibition features such inclusions as the study of the little girl.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Dotted lines indicate the text s margins.</i>
<u>insinuate</u>	Give to understand. <i>I insinuated that I did not like his wife.</i>
<u>involve</u>	Be or become occupied or engrossed in something. <i>Her husband had been very involved in his work.</i>
overtone	A component of any oscillation whose frequency is an integral multiple of the fundamental frequency. <i>Overtones of despair.</i>
parallelism	The use of successive verbal constructions in poetry or prose which correspond in grammatical structure, sound, metre, meaning, etc. <i>Parallelism suggests a connection of meaning through an echo of form.</i>
<u>pertain</u>	Be relevant to. <i>My remark pertained to your earlier comments.</i>
quiet	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The car has a quiet economical engine.</i>
reality	Relating to reality TV. <i>A reality show.</i>
<u>silent</u>	(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. <i>A silent house.</i>
<u>symbol</u>	Symbolize. <i>The Red Cross symbol.</i>
<u>tacit</u>	Understood or implied without being stated. <i>Your silence may be taken to mean tacit agreement.</i>
uncommunicative	Not inclined to talk or give information or express opinions. <i>He had always been quiet and uncommunicative having few friends.</i>
