bother	Effort, trouble, or difficulty. <i>It may seem like too much <b>bother</b> to cook just for yourself.</i>
<u>burden</u>	The refrain or chorus of a song. The tax <b>burden</b> on low wage earners.



<u>charge</u>	The price charged for some article or service. The battle began with a cavalry <b>charge</b> .
demand	The act of demanding. A <b>demand</b> for specialists.
duty	A moral or legal obligation; a responsibility. It s my <b>duty</b> to uphold the law.
encumbrance	A charge against property (as a lien or mortgage. The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an <b>encumbrance</b> .
exaction	A sum of money exacted from someone. <i>He supervised the <b>exaction</b> of tolls at various ports.</i>
<u>excise</u>	A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate. <i>The rate of excise duty on spirits.</i>
fee	An interest in land capable of being inherited. They were faced with legal <b>fee</b> s of 3000.
impost	Money collected under a tariff. Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other <b>impost</b> s.
infliction	An act causing pain or damage. The repeated <b>infliction</b> of pain.
levy	A tax raised by levying. Edward I and Edward II had made substantial use of the feudal <b>levy</b> for raising an army.
load	The amount of electricity supplied by a generating system at any given time. She spends <b>load</b> s of money on clothes.
onus	An onerous or difficult concern. The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.
payment	The action or process of paying someone or something or of being paid. <i>Ask for a discount for payment by cash.</i>
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. Gas can be fed to the turbines at a <b>pressure</b> of around 250 psi.
strain	The general meaning or substance of an utterance. A new <b>strain</b> of microorganisms.
tariff	A list of import or export tariffs. The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariff</b> s.



<u>tax</u>	A compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits, or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions. <i>Tax cuts.</i>
<u>tithe</u>	An offering of a tenth part of some personal income. <i>He hadn t said a <b>tithe</b> of the prayers he knew.</i>
<u>toll</u>	A charge for a long-distance telephone call. She heard the distant <b>toll</b> of church bells.
worry	A source of anxiety. It s a major <b>worry</b> .

account	To give an account or representation of in words. <i>He gave an inaccurate <b>account</b> of the plot to kill the president.</i>
annoyance	An unpleasant person who is annoying or exasperating. <i>The Council found him an <b>annoyance</b></i> .
bill	A list of particulars as a playbill or bill of fare. He pulled down the <b>bill</b> of his cap and trudged ahead.
<u>council</u>	Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent. Student council.
court	The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign. <i>The emperor is shown with his <b>court</b>.</i>
customs	The place at a port, airport, or frontier where officials check incoming goods, travellers, or luggage. An inflow of <b>customs</b> duties to the Treasury.
duty	(of a visit or other undertaking) done from a sense of moral obligation rather than for pleasure. <i>She was determined to do her <b>duty</b> as a citizen.</i>



enforcement	The act of compelling observance of or compliance with a law, rule, or obligation. The strict <b>enforcement</b> of environmental regulations.
<u>enjoin</u>	Prohibit someone from performing (a particular action) by issuing an injunction. The code <b>enjoin</b> ed members to trade fairly.
expire	(of a period of time) come to an end. <i>His driving licence <b>expire</b>d</i> .
implementation	The process of putting a decision or plan into effect; execution. The agency was created for the <b>implementation</b> of the policy.
<u>income</u>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. He has a nice home and an adequate <b>income</b> .
infliction	A nuisance. The repeated <b>infliction</b> of pain.
injunction	A judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i>Injunction</i> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.
<u>law</u>	Statute law and the common law. <i>Law</i> enforcement.
levy	An act of levying a tax fee or fine. Police forces receive 49 per cent of their funding via a <b>levy</b> on the rates.
obedience	Compliance with an order, request, or law or submission to another's authority. <i>Their children were never very strong on obedience</i> .
obeisance	A gesture expressing deferential respect, such as a bow or curtsy. <i>They paid <b>obeisance</b> to the Prince</i> .
<u>obey</u>	Be obedient to. When the order was repeated he refused to <b>obey</b> .
overpayment	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayment</b>s.</i>
pecuniary	Relating to or consisting of money. <i>He received thanks but no <b>pecuniary</b> compensation for his services.</i>
punishment	A penalty inflicted as retribution for an offence. <i>Crime demands just <b>punishment</b></i> .
refund	A repayment of a sum of money. You may be allowed to claim a <b>refund</b> of the tax.



<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. When the <b>revenue</b> makes a demand for tax that demand is implicitly backed by the powers of the state.
sequestrate	Declare (someone) bankrupt. Two more poll tax rebels were <b>sequestrate</b> d.
tariff	Charge a tariff. These services are <b>tariff</b> ed by volume.
<u>tax</u>	Pay tax on something especially a vehicle. An officer <b>tax</b> ing a bill of costs.
taxable	Liable to be taxed; subject to tax. <i>Taxable</i> income.
<u>tithe</u>	Pay one tenth of pay tithes on especially to the church. <i>He</i> <b>tithe</b> <i>d</i> his income to the Church.
vat	Place or treat in a vat. The grapes are <b>vat</b> ted for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.
