- *An uncalled-for burden.*
- *The act of imposing something (as a tax or an embargo).*
- *A tax or duty.*
- *A particular arrangement of imposed pages.*

bother	Effort, trouble, or difficulty. <i>It may seem like too much bother to cook just for yourself.</i>
burden	The refrain or chorus of a song. <i>The tax burden on low wage earners.</i>

<u>charge</u>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>The battle began with a cavalry charge.</i>
demand	The act of demanding. <i>A demand for specialists.</i>
duty	A moral or legal obligation; a responsibility. <i>It s my duty to uphold the law.</i>
encumbrance	A charge against property (as a lien or mortgage). <i>The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an encumbrance.</i>
exaction	A sum of money exacted from someone. <i>He supervised the exaction of tolls at various ports.</i>
<u>excise</u>	A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate). <i>The rate of excise duty on spirits.</i>
fee	An interest in land capable of being inherited. <i>They were faced with legal fees of 3000.</i>
impost	Money collected under a tariff. <i>Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other imposts.</i>
infliction	An act causing pain or damage. <i>The repeated infliction of pain.</i>
levy	A tax raised by levying. <i>Edward I and Edward II had made substantial use of the feudal levy for raising an army.</i>
load	The amount of electricity supplied by a generating system at any given time. <i>She spends loads of money on clothes.</i>
onus	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The onus is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
payment	The action or process of paying someone or something or of being paid. <i>Ask for a discount for payment by cash.</i>
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. <i>Gas can be fed to the turbines at a pressure of around 250 psi.</i>
strain	The general meaning or substance of an utterance. <i>A new strain of microorganisms.</i>
tariff	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import tariffs.</i>

tax

A compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits, or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions.

***Tax** cuts.*

tithe

An offering of a tenth part of some personal income.

*He hadn't said a **tithe** of the prayers he knew.*

toll

A charge for a long-distance telephone call.

*She heard the distant **toll** of church bells.*

worry

A source of anxiety.

*It's a major **worry**.*

- *The imposition of martial law.*
- *He listened but resented the imposition.*
- *I'd like to see you, if that wouldn't be too much of an imposition.*

account

To give an account or representation of in words.

*He gave an inaccurate **account** of the plot to kill the president.*

annoyance

An unpleasant person who is annoying or exasperating.

*The Council found him an **annoyance**.*

bill

A list of particulars as a playbill or bill of fare.

*He pulled down the **bill** of his cap and trudged ahead.*

council

Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent.

*Student **council**.*

court

The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign.

*The emperor is shown with his **court**.*

customs

The place at a port, airport, or frontier where officials check incoming goods, travellers, or luggage.

*An inflow of **customs** duties to the Treasury.*

duty

(of a visit or other undertaking) done from a sense of moral obligation rather than for pleasure.

*She was determined to do her **duty** as a citizen.*

enforcement	The act of compelling observance of or compliance with a law, rule, or obligation. <i>The strict enforcement of environmental regulations.</i>
<u>enjoin</u>	Prohibit someone from performing (a particular action) by issuing an injunction. <i>The code enjoined members to trade fairly.</i>
expire	(of a period of time) come to an end. <i>His driving licence expired.</i>
<u>implementation</u>	The process of putting a decision or plan into effect; execution. <i>The agency was created for the implementation of the policy.</i>
<u>income</u>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate income.</i>
infliction	A nuisance. <i>The repeated infliction of pain.</i>
injunction	A judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i>Injunction were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<u>law</u>	Statute law and the common law. <i>Law enforcement.</i>
levy	An act of levying a tax fee or fine. <i>Police forces receive 49 per cent of their funding via a levy on the rates.</i>
<u>obedience</u>	Compliance with an order, request, or law or submission to another's authority. <i>Their children were never very strong on obedience.</i>
obeisance	A gesture expressing deferential respect, such as a bow or curtsy. <i>They paid obeisance to the Prince.</i>
<u>obey</u>	Be obedient to. <i>When the order was repeated he refused to obey.</i>
overpayment	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit overpayments.</i>
pecuniary	Relating to or consisting of money. <i>He received thanks but no pecuniary compensation for his services.</i>
punishment	A penalty inflicted as retribution for an offence. <i>Crime demands just punishment.</i>
refund	A repayment of a sum of money. <i>You may be allowed to claim a refund of the tax.</i>

<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>When the revenue makes a demand for tax that demand is implicitly backed by the powers of the state.</i>
sequester	Declare (someone) bankrupt. <i>Two more poll tax rebels were sequestered.</i>
tariff	Charge a tariff. <i>These services are tariffed by volume.</i>
<u>tax</u>	Pay tax on something especially a vehicle. <i>An officer taxing a bill of costs.</i>
taxable	Liable to be taxed; subject to tax. <i>Taxable income.</i>
<u>tithe</u>	Pay one tenth of pay tithes on especially to the church. <i>He tithed his income to the Church.</i>
vat	Place or treat in a vat. <i>The grapes are vatted for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.</i>
