- *A particular arrangement of imposed pages.*

<b>bother</b>	Effort, trouble, or difficulty. <i>It may seem like too much <b>bother</b> to cook just for yourself.</i>
<a href="#"><b>burden</b></a>	The refrain or chorus of a song. <i>The tax <b>burden</b> on low wage earners.</i>

<b><u>charge</u></b>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>The battle began with a cavalry <b>charge</b>.</i>
<b>demand</b>	The act of demanding. <i>A <b>demand</b> for specialists.</i>
<b>duty</b>	A moral or legal obligation; a responsibility. <i>It s my <b>duty</b> to uphold the law.</i>
<b>encumbrance</b>	A charge against property (as a lien or mortgage). <i>The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an <b>encumbrance</b>.</i>
<b>exaction</b>	A sum of money exacted from someone. <i>He supervised the <b>exaction</b> of tolls at various ports.</i>
<b><u>excise</u></b>	A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate). <i>The rate of <b>excise</b> duty on spirits.</i>
<b>fee</b>	An interest in land capable of being inherited. <i>They were faced with legal <b>fees</b> of 3000.</i>
<b>impost</b>	Money collected under a tariff. <i>Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other <b>imposts</b>.</i>
<b>infliction</b>	An act causing pain or damage. <i>The repeated <b>infliction</b> of pain.</i>
<b>levy</b>	A tax raised by levying. <i>Edward I and Edward II had made substantial use of the feudal <b>levy</b> for raising an army.</i>
<b>load</b>	The amount of electricity supplied by a generating system at any given time. <i>She spends <b>loads</b> of money on clothes.</i>
<b>onus</b>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The action or process of paying someone or something or of being paid. <i>Ask for a discount for <b>payment</b> by cash.</i>
<b>pressure</b>	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. <i>Gas can be fed to the turbines at a <b>pressure</b> of around 250 psi.</i>
<b>strain</b>	The general meaning or substance of an utterance. <i>A new <b>strain</b> of microorganisms.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariffs</b>.</i>

**tax**

A compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits, or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions.

***Tax** cuts.*

**tithe**

An offering of a tenth part of some personal income.

*He hadn't said a **tithe** of the prayers he knew.*

**toll**

A charge for a long-distance telephone call.

*She heard the distant **toll** of church bells.*

**worry**

A source of anxiety.

*It's a major **worry**.*

**account**

To give an account or representation of in words.

*He gave an inaccurate **account** of the plot to kill the president.*

**annoyance**

An unpleasant person who is annoying or exasperating.

*The Council found him an **annoyance**.*

**bill**

A list of particulars as a playbill or bill of fare.

*He pulled down the **bill** of his cap and trudged ahead.*

**council**

Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent.

*Student **council**.*

**court**

The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign.

*The emperor is shown with his **court**.*

**customs**

The place at a port, airport, or frontier where officials check incoming goods, travellers, or luggage.

*An inflow of **customs** duties to the Treasury.*

**duty**

(of a visit or other undertaking) done from a sense of moral obligation rather than for pleasure.

*She was determined to do her **duty** as a citizen.*

<b>enforcement</b>	The act of compelling observance of or compliance with a law, rule, or obligation. <i>The strict <b>enforcement</b> of environmental regulations.</i>
<b><u>enjoin</u></b>	Prohibit someone from performing (a particular action) by issuing an injunction. <i>The code <b>enjoined</b> members to trade fairly.</i>
<b>expire</b>	(of a period of time) come to an end. <i>His driving licence <b>expired</b>.</i>
<b><u>implementation</u></b>	The process of putting a decision or plan into effect; execution. <i>The agency was created for the <b>implementation</b> of the policy.</i>
<b><u>income</u></b>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate <b>income</b>.</i>
<b>infliction</b>	A nuisance. <i>The repeated <b>infliction</b> of pain.</i>
<b>injunction</b>	A judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i><b>Injunction</b> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<b><u>law</u></b>	Statute law and the common law. <i><b>Law</b> enforcement.</i>
<b>levy</b>	An act of levying a tax fee or fine. <i>Police forces receive 49 per cent of their funding via a <b>levy</b> on the rates.</i>
<b><u>obedience</u></b>	Compliance with an order, request, or law or submission to another's authority. <i>Their children were never very strong on <b>obedience</b>.</i>
<b>obeisance</b>	A gesture expressing deferential respect, such as a bow or curtsy. <i>They paid <b>obeisance</b> to the Prince.</i>
<b><u>obey</u></b>	Be obedient to. <i>When the order was repeated he refused to <b>obey</b>.</i>
<b>overpayment</b>	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayments</b>.</i>
<b>pecuniary</b>	Relating to or consisting of money. <i>He received thanks but no <b>pecuniary</b> compensation for his services.</i>
<b>punishment</b>	A penalty inflicted as retribution for an offence. <i>Crime demands just <b>punishment</b>.</i>
<b>refund</b>	A repayment of a sum of money. <i>You may be allowed to claim a <b>refund</b> of the tax.</i>

<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>When the <b>revenue</b> makes a demand for tax that demand is implicitly backed by the powers of the state.</i>
<b>sequesterate</b>	Declare (someone) bankrupt. <i>Two more poll tax rebels were <b>sequestered</b>.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	Charge a tariff. <i>These services are <b>tariffed</b> by volume.</i>
<u>tax</u>	Pay tax on something especially a vehicle. <i>An officer <b>taxing</b> a bill of costs.</i>
<b>taxable</b>	Liable to be taxed; subject to tax. <i><b>Taxable</b> income.</i>
<u>tithe</u>	Pay one tenth of pay tithes on especially to the church. <i>He <b>tithed</b> his income to the Church.</i>
<b>vat</b>	Place or treat in a vat. <i>The grapes are <b>vatted</b> for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.</i>
