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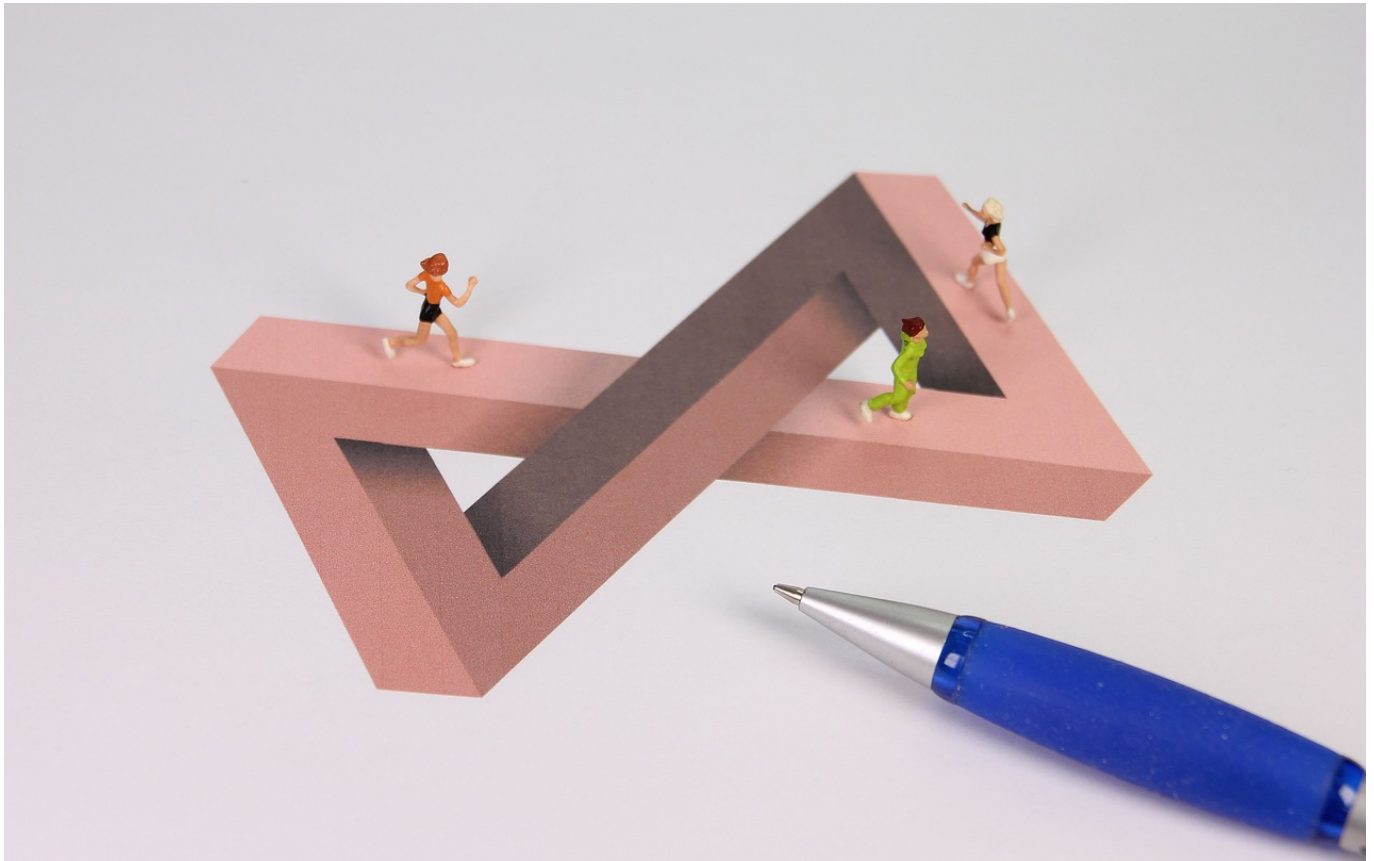

- *Not capable of occurring or being accomplished or dealt with.*
- *(of a person) very unreasonable.*
- *Totally unlikely.*
- *Not able to occur, exist, or be done.*
- *(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable.*
- *Used of persons or their behavior.*

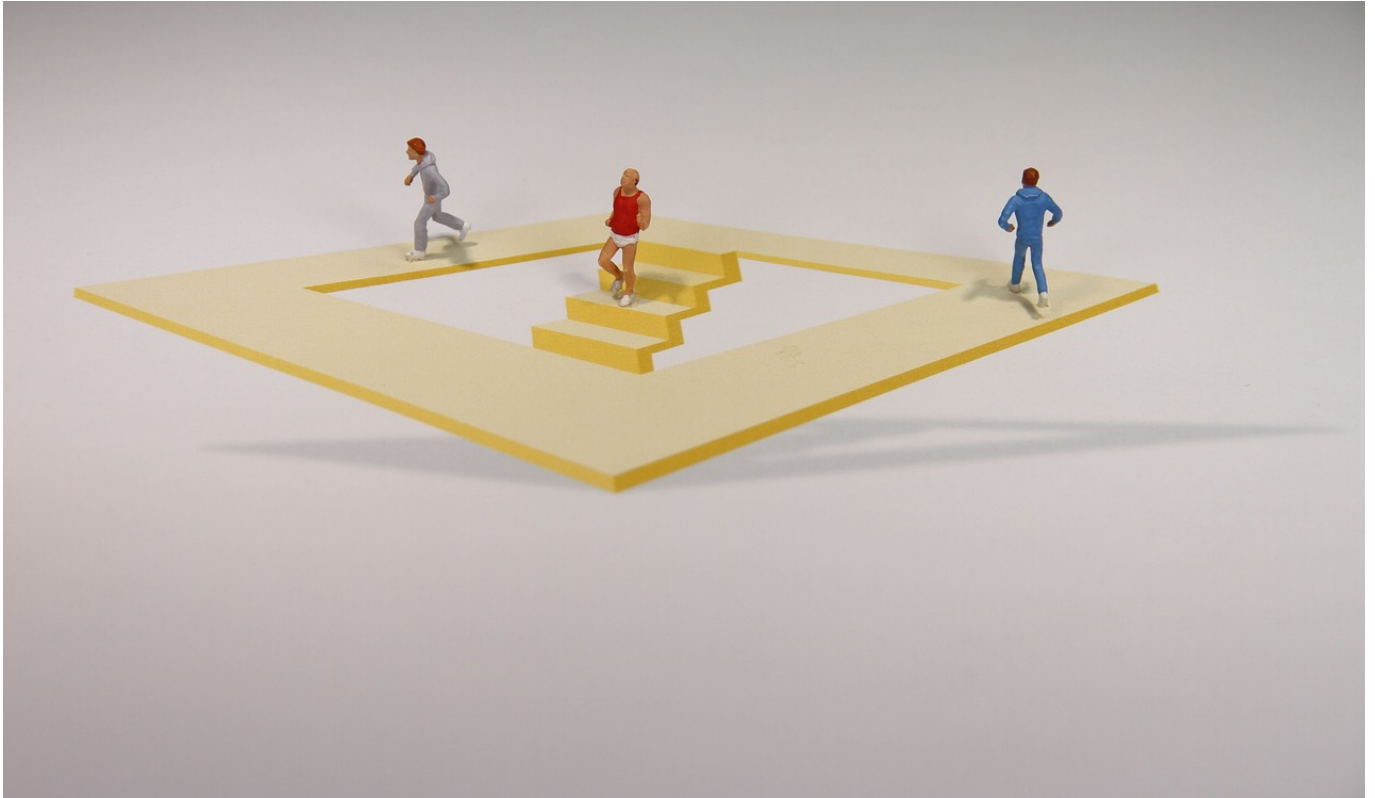


Synonyms of "Impossible" as an adjective (28 Words)

awkward	Deliberately unreasonable or uncooperative. <i>Some awkward questions.</i>
demanding	(of a task) requiring much skill or effort. <i>A baby can be so demanding.</i>
difficult	Characterized by or causing hardships or problems. <i>A difficult child.</i>
hopeless	(informal to emphasize how bad it is) beyond hope of management or reform. <i>In an agony of hopeless grief.</i>
implausible	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>This is a blatantly implausible claim.</i>
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was impracticable to widen the road here.</i>
<u>impractical</u>	(of a person) not skilled or interested in doing practical work. <i>An impractical solution.</i>

<u>inconceivable</u>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>It seemed inconceivable that the president had been unaware of what was going on.</i>
intolerable	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>The intolerable pressures of his work.</i>
intractable	Hard to control or deal with. <i>Intractable pain.</i>
not possible	Existing in possibility.
not worth considering	Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically).
objectionable	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>Found the politician's views objectionable.</i>
out of the question	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
perverse	Marked by a disposition to oppose and contradict. <i>An evil life dedicated to perverse pleasure.</i>
recalcitrant	Marked by stubborn resistance to authority. <i>The University suspended the most recalcitrant demonstrators.</i>
unacceptable	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was unacceptable.</i>
unachievable	(of an aim or objective) too difficult to be achieved. <i>An unachievable political goal.</i>
<u>unattainable</u>	Impossible to achieve. <i>An unattainable goal.</i>
<u>unbearable</u>	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
unendurable	Not able to be tolerated or endured. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>
ungovernable	Impossible to control or govern. <i>An ungovernable impulse to run away.</i>
unimaginable	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
unmanageable	Incapable of being controlled or managed. <i>An unmanageable situation.</i>
<u>unobtainable</u>	Not capable of being obtained. <i>Timber is virtually unobtainable in the islands.</i>
<u>unsustainable</u>	Not able to be maintained at the current rate or level. <i>Both remarks are unsustainable.</i>

unworkable	(of a material) not able to be worked. <i>The alloy becomes brittle and almost unworkable.</i>
wayward	Difficult to control or predict because of wilful or perverse behaviour. <i>A wayward adolescent.</i>

- astounding** Bewildering or striking dumb with wonder.
*The summit offers **astounding** views.*
- farfetched** Highly imaginative but unlikely.
*A **farfetched** excuse.*
- illogical** Lacking in correct logical relation.
*An **illogical** fear of the supernatural.*
- implausible** (of an argument or statement) not seeming reasonable or probable; failing to convince.
*Gave the teacher an **implausible** excuse.*
- impracticable** Not capable of being carried out or put into practice.
*Refloating the sunken ship proved **impracticable** because of its fragility.*

improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>An improbable event.</i>
improbably	Not easy to believe. <i>Everyone in the film is improbably gorgeous.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Totally unlikely. <i>They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.</i>
incredible	Very good; wonderful. <i>The book's plot is simply incredible.</i>
incredibly	Used to introduce a statement that is hard to believe; strangely. <i>Michele was incredibly brave.</i>
indefensible	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>This behaviour is morally indefensible.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational animals.</i>
levity	The treatment of a serious matter with humour or lack of due respect. <i>As an attempt to introduce a note of levity the words were a disastrous flop.</i>
miraculously	In a remarkable and extremely lucky manner. <i>A shrine where people bring the sick to be miraculously healed.</i>
<u>mission</u>	A building or group of buildings used by a Christian mission. <i>Gandhi's attitude to mission and conversion.</i>
<u>surprising</u>	Causing surprise; unexpected. <i>Leaped up with surprising agility.</i>
try	An act of trying something new or different to see if it is suitable effective or pleasant. <i>She agreed that they should give the idea a try.</i>
unacceptable	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>An unacceptable violation of personal freedom.</i>
<u>unbelievable</u>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>Your audacity is unbelievable.</i>
unbelievably	Not easy to believe. <i>The show went unbelievably well.</i>
<u>unconvincing</u>	Not convincing. <i>A slightly bizarre and unconvincing fusion of musical forces.</i>

<u>undue</u>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn't want to show undue excitement.</i>
<u>unimaginable</u>	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>
<u>unlikely</u>	Having a probability too low to inspire belief. <i>An unlikely explanation.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
<u>unreliable</u>	Not able to be relied upon. <i>In the early 1950s computers were large and expensive and unreliable.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	(especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>
<u>unthinkable</u>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. <i>It was unthinkable that John could be dead.</i>
