<u>romantic</u> romanticism.

Her **romantic** adventures.

**starry-eyed** Unrealistically or naively optimistic.

Inconvenient or impractical.

**unfeasible** Childcare is expensive making the return to work **unfeasible** 

for many women.

unrealistic Not realistic.

unsuitable Not capable of being applied.
