dreamy

Dreamy in mood or nature.

*A slow **dreamy** melody.*

fanciful

Highly ornamental or imaginative in design.

*The falsehood about some **fanciful** secret treaties.*

head-in-the-clouds

Guided by whim and fancy.

idealistic

Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.

***Idealistic** young doctors who went to work for the rebels.*

impracticable	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved impracticable because of its fragility.</i>
inappropriate	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Put inappropriate pressure on them.</i>
laputan	Relating to or characteristic of the imaginary country of Laputa or its people.
not sensible	Readily perceived by the senses.
out of touch with reality	Being out or having grown cold.
quixotic	Not sensible about practical matters; idealistic and unrealistic. <i>As quixotic as a restoration of medieval knighthood.</i>
romantic	Relating to or denoting the artistic and literary movement of romanticism. <i>Her romantic adventures.</i>
starry-eyed	Unrealistically or naively optimistic.
unfeasible	Inconvenient or impractical. <i>Childcare is expensive making the return to work unfeasible for many women.</i>
unrealistic	Not realistic. <i>Unrealistic expectations.</i>
unserviceable	Not ready for service. <i>Unserviceable equipment may be replaced.</i>
unsuitable	Not capable of being applied. <i>A solvent unsuitable for use on wood surfaces.</i>
unworkable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>The alloy becomes brittle and almost unworkable.</i>
visionary	Not practical or realizable; speculative. <i>A visionary leader.</i>
windy	(of a person) nervous or anxious about something. <i>Long winded or windy speakers.</i>

gawky	Lacking grace in movement or posture. <i>A gawky lad with long ungainly legs.</i>
highly	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>He spoke highly of her.</i>

ideal	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>Mathematical modelling can determine theoretically ideal conditions.</i>
incongruent	Incongruous; incompatible.
inflated	Enlarged beyond truth or reasonableness. <i>A partially inflated balloon.</i>
laudatory	(of speech or writing) expressing praise and commendation. <i>A laudatory remark.</i>
passionate	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. <i>He s passionate about football.</i>
praising	Full of or giving praise.
prohibitive	(of a law or rule) forbidding or restricting something. <i>The price was prohibitive.</i>
