edition	A particular instance of a regular radio or television programme. <i>It was too late for the morning edition.</i>
effect	A symptom caused by an illness or a drug. <i>He just did it for effect.</i>
estimation	A document appraising the value of something (as for insurance or taxation). <i>They had a high estimation of his ability.</i>
fancy	Something many people believe that is false. <i>People jostled to ride alongside their fancy.</i>
feeling	A sensitivity to or intuitive understanding of. <i>I disliked him and the feeling was mutual.</i>
hollow	A depression hollowed out of solid matter. <i>He held them in the hollow of his hand.</i>

hunch	A thick piece; a hunk. <i>I have a hunch that someone is telling lies.</i>
image	The general impression that a person, organization, or product presents to the public. <i>He s the image of his father.</i>
imitation	The doctrine that representations of nature or human behavior should be accurate imitations. <i>He attempted an atrocious imitation of my English accent.</i>
impact	A forceful consequence; a strong effect. <i>There was the sound of a third impact.</i>
impersonation	Pretending to be another person. <i>He did an impersonation of Fred Astaire.</i>
imprint	A brand name under which books are published, typically the name of a former publishing house that is now part of a larger group. <i>English stills bears the imprint of the Norman invasion.</i>
imprinting	A concavity in a surface produced by pressing.
indentation	A concave cut into a surface or edge (as in a coastline). <i>Paragraphs are marked off by indentation.</i>
influence	A person or thing with the capacity to have an influence on someone or something. <i>Their friends are having a bad influence on them.</i>
inkling	A slight suggestion or vague understanding. <i>The records give us an inkling of how people saw the world.</i>
interpretation	A stylistic representation of a creative work or dramatic role. <i>The interpretation of data.</i>
intuition	A thing that one knows or considers likely from instinctive feeling rather than conscious reasoning. <i>He had an intuition that something had gone wrong.</i>
issue	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>A point of issue.</i>
judgement	The determination by a court of competent jurisdiction on matters submitted to it. <i>County court judgements against individuals in debt.</i>
mark	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person s score. <i>His answer was just a punctuation mark.</i>

mimicry	The resemblance of an animal species to another species or to natural objects; provides concealment and protection from predators. <i>The word was spoken with gently teasing mimicry.</i>
notion	A vague idea in which some confidence is placed. <i>I had no notion of what her words meant.</i>
opinion	A barrister's advice on the merits of a case. <i>The solicitor took counsel's opinion.</i>
outline	A line or set of lines enclosing or indicating the shape of an object in a sketch or diagram. <i>An outline of parliamentary procedure.</i>
perception	Awareness of something through the senses. <i>Hollywood's perception of the tastes of the American public.</i>
picture	Illustrations used to decorate or explain a text. <i>The political picture is favorable.</i>
portrayal	A description of someone or something in a particular way; a representation. <i>His portrayal of the title character.</i>
print run	A printed picture produced from a photographic negative.
printing	A single impression of a book. <i>They ran off an initial printing of 2000 copies.</i>
publication	A book or journal issued for public sale. <i>Scientific publications.</i>
rendering	The action of giving or surrendering something. <i>A trompe l'oeil rendering of Mount Rushmore.</i>
rendition	The act of interpreting something as expressed in an artistic performance. <i>A pen and ink rendition of Mars with his sword drawn.</i>
representation	The action of speaking or acting on behalf of someone or the state of being so represented. <i>Certain representations were made concerning police brutality.</i>
reprint	A publication such as a book that is reprinted without changes or editing and offered again for sale. <i>The publishers had nearly sold out of the initial run of copies and ordered a reprint.</i>
sense	Relating to or denoting a coding sequence of nucleotides complementary to an antisense sequence. <i>I can't see the sense in leaving all the work to you.</i>
sneaking suspicion	Someone acting as an informer or decoy for the police.

stamp	An instrument for stamping a pattern or mark in particular an engraved or inked block or die. <i>The whole project has the stamp of authority.</i>
stamping	A block or die used to imprint a mark or design.
suspicion	Cautious distrust. <i>Her activities were regarded with suspicion by the headmistress.</i>
verdict	An opinion or judgement. <i>The jury returned a verdict of not guilty.</i>

<u>systemic</u>	Denoting the part of the circulatory system concerned with the transport of oxygen to and carbon dioxide from the body in general, especially as distinct from the pulmonary part concerned with the transport of oxygen from and carbon dioxide to the lungs. <i>The disease is localized rather than systemic.</i>
<u>validity</u>	The state of being legally or officially binding or acceptable. <i>Return travel must be within the validity of the ticket.</i>
