
Imprisonment as a Noun

Synonyms of "Imprisonment" as a noun (7 Words)

captivity The condition of being imprisoned or confined.

He was held in captivity until he died.

confinement The act of restraining of a person's liberty by confining them.

He was held in **confinement**.

Guardianship over; in divorce cases it is the right to house and care for and

custody discipline a child.

He is in the **custody** of police.

detention A state of being confined (usually for a short time.

Masters gave lines or detentions.

immurement The state of being imprisoned.

He practiced the **immurement** of his enemies in the castle dungeon.

incarceration The state of being imprisoned.

 $^{f u}$ His ignominious **incarceration** in the local jail.

internment Placing private property in the custody of an officer of the law. *He was threatened with* **internment** in a concentration camp.



Usage Examples of "Imprisonment" as a noun

• He was sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

The act of keeping something within specified bounds (by force if necessary. confinement

A final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is

conviction imposed.

She had been speaking for some five minutes with force and **conviction**.

Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. **culprit**

The car's front nearside door had been smashed in but the **culprit**s had fled.

The protective care or guardianship of someone or something. custody

The suspect is in **custody**.

A state of being confined (usually for a short time. detention

Teachers were divided as to the effectiveness of **detention**.

Imprison someone in a dungeon. <u>dungeon</u>

Forcible restraint or imprisonment. duress

Confessions extracted under **duress**.

Written formally in a large clear script, as a deed or other legal document. <u>engrossed</u>

That **engrossed** look or rapt delight.

Lock up or confine, in or as in a jail. incarcerate

The murderer was **incarcerate**d for the rest of his life.

A formal document written for a prosecuting attorney charging a person

indictment with some offense.

An **indictment** for conspiracy.

One of several occupants of a house. inmate

Inmates of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.



Intention or purpose. intent

Good **intent**ions are not enough.

Lock up or confine in or as in a jail. jail

He spent 15 years in **jail**.

Release a prisoner on parole. parole

He was **parole**d after serving nine months of a two year sentence.

A prison for people convicted of serious crimes. penitentiary

Penitentiary institutions.

A person who carries out a harmful, illegal, or immoral act. perpetrator

The **perpetrator**s of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.

Deeply absorbed in thought. preoccupied

She seemed a bit **preoccupied**.

A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. prison

Both men were sent to **prison**.

A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war. prisoner

She may have been held **prisoner** before being killed.

A person who has been repatriated. repatriate

The last German POWs were **repatriate**d in November 1948.

Forced to turn and face attackers. trapped

Like a **trapped** animal.

A prison officer. warden

An air raid **warden**.
