<u>spontaneous</u>	(of movement or activity in an organism) instinctive or involuntary. <i>Spontaneous miscarriages.</i>
unarranged	Not placed in a neat, attractive, or required order. <i>She threw a bonnet over her unarranged hair.</i>
<u>unplanned</u>	Not done with purpose or intent. <i>An unplanned economy.</i>
unpremeditated	(of an act, remark, or state) not thought out or planned beforehand. <i>It was a totally unpremeditated attack.</i>
<u>unprepared</u>	Not willing to do something. <i>Our treaty makers approached their immensely difficult problems unprepared.</i>
unrehearsed	Not practised before a performance. <i>Spontaneous and unrehearsed music.</i>
unscripted	Not furnished with or using a script. <i>The president's unscripted remarks.</i>
unstudied	Lacking knowledge gained by study often in a particular field. <i>Simple unstudied charm.</i>

<u>compose</u>	Settle (a dispute). <i>Christians compose 40 per cent of the state's population.</i>
currently	At this time or period; now. <i>The EC is currently attempting greater economic integration.</i>
<u>exigent</u>	Pressing; demanding. <i>The exigent demands of her contemporaries' music took a toll on her voice.</i>

extemporaneous	Spoken or done without preparation. <i>An extemporaneous speech.</i>
extempore	Without preparation. <i>He recited the poem extempore.</i>
extemporize	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He extemporized at the piano.</i>
immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>An immediate influence.</i>
immediately	In direct or very close relation. <i>They would be the states most immediately affected by any such action.</i>
imminent	Overhanging. <i>They were in imminent danger of being swept away.</i>
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>A fortune teller with dire warnings about impending doom.</i>
<u>improvise</u>	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>I improvised a costume for myself out of an old blue dress.</i>
improvised	Created and performed spontaneously or without preparation; impromptu. <i>We slept on improvised beds.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. <i>The offence justified instant dismissal.</i>
instantaneous	Existing or measured at a particular instant. <i>Measurement of the instantaneous velocity.</i>
<u>instantly</u>	Urgently or persistently. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
now	In these times- Nancy Mitford. <i>Mum says you might let me have some of your stamps Does she now.</i>
offhand	Ungraciously or offensively nonchalant or cool in manner. <i>She had made these remarks offhandedly.</i>
oratory	A small chapel, especially for private worship. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>
pressing	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>At the pressing of a button.</i>

prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>The online form prompts users for data.</i>
<u>promptly</u>	With little or no delay; immediately. <i>The rescue squad arrived promptly.</i>
resumption	Beginning again. <i>Property resumptions would be required to develop the bus routes.</i>
song	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The song of bullets was in the air.</i>
<u>spontaneous</u>	Having an open, natural, and uninhibited manner. <i>The spontaneous mechanical activity of circular smooth muscle.</i>
spontaneously	Without advance preparation. <i>A surprising number of early pregnancies spontaneously abort.</i>
<u>swiftly</u>	Without delay; after a very short time. <i>She moved swiftly.</i>
<u>today</u>	In these times- Nancy Mitford. <i>Today is a rest day.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	(military) a person who freely enlists for service. <i>A voluntary helper.</i>
