- *Exemption from punishment or freedom from the injurious consequences of an action.*
- *Exemption from punishment or loss.*

### Synonyms of "Impunity" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>exemption</b>	Immunity from an obligation or duty. <i>Vehicles that may qualify for <b>exemption</b> from tax.</i>
<b>exemption from punishment</b>	Immunity from an obligation or duty.
<b>freedom from punishment</b>	The condition of being free; the power to act or speak or think without externally imposed restraints.
<b>immunity</b>	Protection or exemption from something, especially an obligation or penalty. <i><b>Immunity</b> to typhoid seems to have increased spontaneously.</i>

<b>indemnity</b>	Security against or exemption from legal liability for one's actions. <i>No <b>indemnity</b> will be given for loss of cash.</i>
<b>licence</b>	Freedom to behave as one wishes, especially in a way which results in excessive or unacceptable behaviour. <i>A television <b>licence</b> fee.</i>
<b>with no ill consequences</b>	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions; 7 isotopes are known.
<b>with no ill effects</b>	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions; 7 isotopes are known.
<b>without being punished</b>	A living thing that has (or can develop) the ability to act or function independently.
<b>without punishment</b>	The act of punishing.

## Usage Examples of "Impunity" as a noun

- *The impunity enjoyed by military officers implicated in civilian killings.*
- *Protestors burned flags on the streets with impunity.*

## Associations of "Impunity" (30 Words)

<b>castigation</b>	Verbal punishment.
<b>comeuppance</b>	An outcome (good or bad) that is well deserved and fitting. <i>He got his <b>comeuppance</b> in the end.</i>
<b>complicity</b>	Guilt as an accomplice in a crime or offense. <i>They were accused of <b>complicity</b> in the attempt to overthrow the government.</i>
<b><u>conspiracy</u></b>	A group of conspirators banded together to achieve some harmful or illegal purpose. <i>A <b>conspiracy</b> to destroy the government.</i>
<b><u>conviction</u></b>	(criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. <i>She had a previous <b>conviction</b> for a similar offence.</i>
<b>execution</b>	The carrying out of a sentence of death on a condemned person. <i>The film is entirely professional in its <b>execution</b>.</i>
<b>exemption</b>	An act exempting someone. <i>Additional <b>exemptions</b> are allowed for each dependent.</i>

<b>felony</b>	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>gibbet</b>	Hang up a body on a gibbet. <i>Poor Melbourne is <b>gibbeted</b> in The Times.</i>
<b>immunity</b>	The state of not being susceptible. <i><b>Immunity</b> to criticism.</i>
<b><u>indict</u></b>	Formally accuse of or charge with a crime. <i>His former manager was <b>indicted</b> for fraud.</i>
<b>infliction</b>	The act of imposing something (as a tax or an embargo). <i>He s not a friend he s an <b>infliction</b>.</i>
<b>killing</b>	Causing death. <i>The community was shocked by the brutal <b>killings</b>.</i>
<b>misbehave</b>	Behave badly. <i>Josh <b>misbehaved</b> pushing his food off the table.</i>
<b>misbehavior</b>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior.
<b><u>miscreant</u></b>	Heretical. <i>The police are straining every nerve to bring the <b>miscreants</b> to justice.</i>
<b><u>misdeed</u></b>	A wicked or illegal act. <i>His past <b>misdeeds</b> were forgiven.</i>
<b>offence</b>	A feeling of anger caused by being offended. <i>Reductions in strategic <b>offence</b> arsenals.</i>
<b>parricide</b>	A person who commits parricide.
<b>penal</b>	(of an act or offense) subject to punishment by law. <i>The juvenile was sentenced to six months in a <b>penal</b> institution.</i>
<b>penalize</b>	Impose a penalty on; inflict punishment on. <i>Section twenty <b>penalizes</b> possession of a firearm when trespassing.</i>
<b><u>penalty</u></b>	(in sports and games) a handicap imposed on a player or team for infringement of rules. <i>Neglected his health and paid the <b>penalty</b>.</i>
<b>punish</b>	Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on. <i>Fraudulent acts would be <b>punished</b> by up to two years in prison.</i>
<b>punishment</b>	Rough treatment or handling. <i>He approved of stiff <b>punishments</b> for criminals.</i>
<b>retributive</b>	Of or relating to or having the nature of retribution. <i><b>Retributive</b> justice demands an eye for an eye.</i>
<b>spank</b>	Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>When his father caught him he got a <b>spank</b>.</i>

<b><u>torture</u></b>	Subject to torture. <i>Confessions extracted under <b>torture</b>.</i>
<b><u>trial</u></b>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>He called each flip of the coin a new <b>trial</b>.</i>
<b>vindictory</b>	Given or inflicted in requital according to merits or deserts.
<b>violence</b>	A turbulent state resulting in injuries and destruction etc. <i>Screen <b>violence</b>.</i>
