Synonyms of "Impunity" as a noun (10 Words)

exemption	Immunity from an obligation or duty. <i>Vehicles that may qualify for exemption from tax.</i>
exemption from punishment	Immunity from an obligation or duty.
freedom from punishment	The condition of being free; the power to act or speak or think without externally imposed restraints.
immunity	Protection or exemption from something, especially an obligation or penalty. <i>Immunity to typhoid seems to have increased spontaneously.</i>

indemnity	Security against or exemption from legal liability for one's actions. <i>No indemnity will be given for loss of cash.</i>
licence	Freedom to behave as one wishes, especially in a way which results in excessive or unacceptable behaviour. <i>A television licence fee.</i>
with no ill consequences	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions; 7 isotopes are known.
with no ill effects	A radioactive transuranic element synthesized by bombarding curium with carbon ions; 7 isotopes are known.
without being punished	A living thing that has (or can develop) the ability to act or function independently.
without punishment	The act of punishing.

Usage Examples of "Impunity" as a noun

- *The impunity enjoyed by military officers implicated in civilian killings.*
- *Protestors burned flags on the streets with impunity.*

Associations of "Impunity" (30 Words)

castigation	Verbal punishment.
comeuppance	An outcome (good or bad) that is well deserved and fitting. <i>He got his comeuppance in the end.</i>
complicity	Guilt as an accomplice in a crime or offense. <i>They were accused of complicity in the attempt to overthrow the government.</i>
<u>conspiracy</u>	A group of conspirators banded together to achieve some harmful or illegal purpose. <i>A conspiracy to destroy the government.</i>
<u>conviction</u>	(criminal law) a final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. <i>She had a previous conviction for a similar offence.</i>
execution	The carrying out of a sentence of death on a condemned person. <i>The film is entirely professional in its execution.</i>
exemption	An act exempting someone. <i>Additional exemptions are allowed for each dependent.</i>

felony	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of felony.</i>
gibbet	Hang up a body on a gibbet. <i>Poor Melbourne is gibbeted in The Times.</i>
immunity	The state of not being susceptible. <i>Immunity to criticism.</i>
<u>indict</u>	Formally accuse of or charge with a crime. <i>His former manager was indicted for fraud.</i>
infliction	The act of imposing something (as a tax or an embargo). <i>He s not a friend he s an infliction.</i>
killing	Causing death. <i>The community was shocked by the brutal killings.</i>
misbehave	Behave badly. <i>Josh misbehaved pushing his food off the table.</i>
misbehavior	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior.
<u>miscreant</u>	Heretical. <i>The police are straining every nerve to bring the miscreants to justice.</i>
<u>misdeed</u>	A wicked or illegal act. <i>His past misdeeds were forgiven.</i>
offence	A feeling of anger caused by being offended. <i>Reductions in strategic offence arsenals.</i>
parricide	A person who commits parricide.
penal	(of an act or offense) subject to punishment by law. <i>The juvenile was sentenced to six months in a penal institution.</i>
penalize	Impose a penalty on; inflict punishment on. <i>Section twenty penalizes possession of a firearm when trespassing.</i>
<u>penalty</u>	(in sports and games) a handicap imposed on a player or team for infringement of rules. <i>Neglected his health and paid the penalty.</i>
punish	Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on. <i>Fraudulent acts would be punished by up to two years in prison.</i>
punishment	Rough treatment or handling. <i>He approved of stiff punishments for criminals.</i>
retributive	Of or relating to or having the nature of retribution. <i>Retributive justice demands an eye for an eye.</i>
spank	Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>When his father caught him he got a spank.</i>

<u>torture</u>	Subject to torture. <i>Confessions extracted under torture.</i>
<u>trial</u>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>He called each flip of the coin a new trial.</i>
vindictory	Given or inflicted in requital according to merits or deserts.
violence	A turbulent state resulting in injuries and destruction etc. <i>Screen violence.</i>
