## Associations of "In general" (30 Words)

<b>acceptation</b>	A particular sense or the generally recognized meaning common acceptance of a word or phrase.
<b>accepted</b>	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>He wasn't handsome in the <b>accepted</b> sense.</i>
<b>accustomed</b>	In the habit of or adapted to. <i>His <b>accustomed</b> thoroughness.</i>
<b>blandness</b>	Lack of strong emotions, features, or characteristics. <i>The boneless chops were underseasoned to the point of <b>blandness</b>.</i>
<b>commonly</b>	Very often; frequently. <i>Shift workers <b>commonly</b> complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
<b>cosmopolitan</b>	A cosmopolitan person. <i><b>Cosmopolitans</b> who spoke both Spanish and English.</i>
<b>entree</b>	The right to enter. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>everywhere</b>	In or to all places. <i>You find fast food stores <b>everywhere</b>.</i>
<b>exponentially</b>	By means of or as expressed by a mathematical exponent. <i>The coefficients show an <b>exponentially</b> decaying trend.</i>
<b>generally</b>	Without distinction of one from others. <i>A decade when France was moving <b>generally</b> to the left.</i>
<b>inherent</b>	(of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. <i>Any form of mountaineering has its <b>inherent</b> dangers.</i>
<b>known</b>	Publicly acknowledged to be. <i>Plants little <b>known</b> to western science.</i>
<b>mediocre</b>	Of only average quality; not very good. <i>They improved the quality from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>

<b>norm</b>	Adjust something to conform to a norm. <i>It set the <b>norm</b> for American homes.</i>
<b><u>normally</u></b>	Under normal or usual conditions; as a rule. <i>Try to breathe <b>normally</b>.</i>
<b>ordinarily</b>	In a normal way. <i>An effort to behave <b>ordinarily</b>.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	A penny-farthing bicycle. <i>She seemed very <b>ordinary</b>.</i>
<b>popularly</b>	(of a term, name, or title) in informal, common, or non-specialist use. <i>Advancing age is <b>popularly</b> associated with a declining capacity to work.</i>
<b><u>prevail</u></b>	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>She was <b>prevailed</b> upon to give an account of her work.</i>
<b>quotidian</b>	Of or occurring every day; daily. <i>The car sped noisily off through the <b>quotidian</b> traffic.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Organize according to a routine. <i>All had been <b>routined</b> with smoothness.</i>
<b><u>typically</u></b>	With the distinctive qualities of a particular type of person or thing. <i>A <b>typically</b> English village wedding.</i>
<b>ubiquitous</b>	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His <b>ubiquitous</b> influence was felt by all the family.</i>
<b>ubiquity</b>	The state of being everywhere at once (or seeming to be everywhere at once). <i>The growing <b>ubiquity</b> of advertising.</i>
<b>unexceptional</b>	Not special in any way. <i>A <b>unexceptional</b> incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.</i>
<b><u>universal</u></b>	A thing having universal effect currency or application. <i>The incidents caused <b>universal</b> concern.</i>
<b>universally</b>	By everyone; in every case. <i>Progress is not always <b>universally</b> welcomed.</i>
<b><u>usual</u></b>	Habitually or typically occurring or done; customary. <i>The <b>usual</b> greeting.</i>
<b>usually</b>	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>He <b>usually</b> arrives home about one o'clock.</i>
<b><u>wont</u></b>	An established custom. <i>Sons <b>wont</b> to nurse their Parents in old age.</i>
