| diligent | Characterized by care and perseverance in carrying out tasks. <i>A diligent search of the files.</i> |
| employed | (of a person) having a paid job. <i>Up to 40 per cent of employed people are in part time jobs.</i> |
| employment | The act of giving someone a job. <i>He is looking for employment.</i> |
| engaged | Having ones attention or mind or energy engaged. <i>The desperately engaged ships continued the fight.</i> |
| headhunter | A recruiter of personnel (especially for corporations). <i>A headhunter offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i> |

| labor | A political party formed in Great Britain in 1900 characterized by the promotion of labor s interests and formerly the socialization of key industries. <i>She was in labor for six hours.</i> |
| menial | A person with a menial job. <i>Menial factory jobs.</i> |
| occupied | Seized and controlled as by military invasion. <i>She keeps her time well occupied.</i> |
| overtime | Payment for overtime. <i>We worked overtime to fulfil a big order.</i> |
| partnership | An association of two or more people as partners. <i>The partnership now owns 22 department stores.</i> |
| pay | (of a business, activity, or an attitude) be profitable or advantageous. <i>She has been prevailed upon to pay us a visit.</i> |
| proletariat | Working-class people regarded collectively (often used with reference to Marxism). <i>The growth of the industrial proletariat.</i> |
| runaway | A person who has run away, especially from their family or an institution. <i>Runaway boys.</i> |
| scullion | A kitchen servant employed to do menial tasks (especially washing). |
| semiskilled | Possessing or requiring limited skills. <i>A semiskilled job.</i> |
