| <b>employed</b>      | (of a person) having a paid job.<br><i>Up to 40 per cent of <b>employed</b> people are in part time jobs.</i>   |
| <b>employment</b>    | The act of giving someone a job.<br><i>He is looking for <b>employment</b>.</i>   |
| <b>engaged</b>       | Having ones attention or mind or energy engaged.<br><i>The desperately <b>engaged</b> ships continued the fight.</i>  |
| <b>headhunter</b>    | A recruiter of personnel (especially for corporations).<br><i>A <b>headhunter</b> offering you a wonderful new position at a higher salary.</i>   |

| <b>scullion</b>     | A kitchen servant employed to do menial tasks (especially washing).  |
