Associations of "Inaccurately" (30 Words)

defect	Desert (a cause, a country or an army), often in order to join the opposing cause, country, or army. <i>This device permits detection of defects in the lungs.</i>
defective	Markedly subnormal in structure or function or intelligence or behavior. <i>Dystrophin is commonly defective in muscle tissue.</i>
erroneous	Wrong; incorrect. <i>Employers sometimes make erroneous assumptions.</i>
error	(baseball) a failure of a defensive player to make an out when normal play would have sufficed. <i>Spelling errors.</i>
fallacious	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <i>Fallacious testimony.</i>
fallibility	The tendency to make mistakes or be wrong. <i>Studies on the fallibility of memory and perception.</i>
fallible	Likely to fail or make errors. <i>Everyone is fallible to some degree.</i>
faulty	Not working or made correctly; having defects. <i>He submitted a faulty report.</i>
flaw	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>A flaw in the glass.</i>
flawed	Having a blemish or flaw. <i>A fatally flawed strategy.</i>
imperfect	The imperfect tense. <i>Had only an imperfect understanding of his responsibilities.</i>
imprecise	Not precise. <i>The terms he used were imprecise and emotional.</i>

<u>improper</u>	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i>An improper suggestion.</i>
inappropriate	Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i>Noise seems inappropriate at a time of sadness.</i>
inapt	Not elegant or graceful in expression. <i>A more inapt name I cannot imagine.</i>
<u>incorrect</u>	Not correct; not in conformity with fact or truth. <i>An incorrect transcription.</i>
inexact	Not exact. <i>An inexact description.</i>
<u>misconception</u>	An incorrect conception. <i>Public misconceptions about antibiotic use.</i>
misdirect	(of a judge) instruct (a jury) wrongly. <i>Voters were misdirected to the wrong polling station.</i>
misguide	Give bad advice to. <i>A long survey that can only baffle and misguide the general reader.</i>
misinterpret	Interpret falsely. <i>Don't misinterpret my comments as criticism.</i>
<u>misleading</u>	Giving the wrong idea or impression. <i>Your article contains a number of misleading statements.</i>
<u>mistaken</u>	Wrong in one's opinion or judgement. <i>Mistaken identity.</i>
misunderstand	Fail to interpret or understand (something) correctly. <i>Don't misunderstand me I'm not implying she should be working.</i>
<u>omission</u>	The action of excluding or leaving out someone or something. <i>To pay compensation for a wrongful act or omission.</i>
<u>unjust</u>	Not based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair. <i>An unjust judge.</i>
unreliable	Lacking a sense of responsibility. <i>Unreliable information.</i>
unsuitability	The quality of having the wrong properties for a specific purpose.
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>Something is wrong with the engine.</i>
<u>wrongly</u>	In a way that is incorrect or mistaken. <i>Henry wrongly claimed 39 000 of taxpayers money.</i>
