- *Of insufficient quantity to meet a need.*

amateurish	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>A very amateurish job.</i>
bad	Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>Bad air.</i>
<u>deficient</u>	Not having enough of a specified quality or ingredient. <i>A deficient education.</i>
found wanting	Come upon unexpectedly or after searching.
hopeless	Very bad or incompetent. <i>Jess looked at him in mute hopeless appeal.</i>
in short supply	Directed or bound inward.
<u>incapable</u>	Lacking capacity or ability. <i>With the battery removed the car was incapable of being driven.</i>

<u>inefficient</u>	Not achieving maximum productivity; wasting or failing to make the best use of time or resources. <i>Inefficient transport systems.</i>
inept	Revealing lack of perceptiveness or judgment or finesse. <i>An inept remark.</i>

inexpert	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>An inexpert transcription from the real music.</i>
<u>inferior</u>	Of low or inferior quality. <i>Inferior alveolar artery.</i>
<u>insufficient</u>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i>There was insufficient evidence to convict him.</i>
jejune	Lacking interest or significance or impact. <i>Jejune responses to our problems.</i>
lacking	Deficient or inadequate. <i>The students are not lacking in intellectual ability.</i>
no good	Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.
not enough	Sufficient for the purpose.
not good enough	Resulting favorably.
not up to scratch	Extending or moving toward a higher place.
poor	(of a person) deserving of pity or sympathy. <i>Oh you poor thing.</i>
scant	Barely sufficient or adequate. <i>She weighed a scant two pounds.</i>
scanty	Lacking in magnitude or quantity. <i>They paid whatever they could out of their scanty wages to their families.</i>
<u>scarce</u>	Occurring in small numbers or quantities; rare. <i>The freshwater shrimp becomes scarce in soft water.</i>
short	Of a vowel categorized as short with regard to quality and length e g in standard British English the vowel in good is short as distinct from the long vowel u in food. <i>On short rations.</i>
<u>sparse</u>	Scanty; in short supply. <i>Trees were sparse.</i>
substandard	Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i>Substandard spellings.</i>
unequal	Lacking the ability or resources to cope with. <i>She felt unequal to the task before her.</i>
<u>unfit</u>	(of a person) not having the requisite qualities or skills to undertake something competently. <i>Drunk and unfit for service.</i>

unproficient	Unskilful, inept.
<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not satisfactory; not good enough. <i>Years of living in unsatisfactory rented accommodation.</i>
unskilful	Not having or showing skill. <i>Though kind and willing she was unskilful.</i>
<u>useless</u>	Not fulfilling or not expected to achieve the intended purpose or desired outcome. <i>A piece of useless knowledge.</i>

<u>deficient</u>	Insufficient or inadequate. <i>A deficient education.</i>
discontented	Dissatisfied, especially with one's circumstances. <i>I am so discontented with my work.</i>
<u>disgruntled</u>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from disgruntled members of the public.</i>
<u>dissatisfied</u>	Not content or happy with something. <i>Dissatisfied customers.</i>
incompleteness	The state of being crude and incomplete and imperfect. <i>The study was criticized for incompleteness of data but it stimulated further research.</i>
<u>indigent</u>	Poor; needy. <i>A charity for the relief of indigent artists.</i>

<u>inferior</u>	Of low or inferior quality. <i>Ulcers located in the inferior and posterior wall of the duodenum.</i>
insufferable	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>The insufferable heat of August in a New York apartment with no air conditioning.</i>
<u>insufficient</u>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i>Insufficient funds.</i>
intolerable	Unable to be endured. <i>The intolerable pressures of his work.</i>
lacking	Inadequate in amount or degree. <i>There was something lacking in our marriage.</i>
<u>meager</u>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager resources.</i>
measly	Contemptibly small in amount. <i>A measly tip.</i>
scant	Provide grudgingly or in insufficient amounts. <i>Companies with scant regard for the safety of future generations.</i>
scanty	Lacking in magnitude or quantity. <i>Her dress was scanty and revealing.</i>
<u>scarce</u>	Scarcely. <i>They scarcely ever used the emergency generator.</i>
substandard	Falling short of some prescribed norm. <i>Substandard spellings.</i>
unacceptable	Not acceptable; not welcome. <i>A word unacceptable in polite society.</i>
<u>unbearable</u>	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
undermanned	Inadequate in number of workers or assistants etc.
undersized	Smaller than normal for its kind. <i>The undersized cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
unendurable	Not able to be tolerated or endured. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>
unequal	A person or thing regarded as unequal to another in status or level. <i>She was unequal to the task.</i>
unimaginable	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>

<u>unpalatable</u>	Not pleasant to taste. <i>Unpalatable behavior.</i>
<u>unsatisfactory</u>	Not giving satisfaction. <i>Years of living in unsatisfactory rented accommodation.</i>
<u>unsavory</u>	Morally offensive. <i>An unsavory scandal.</i>
<u>unthinkable</u>	(of a situation or event) too unlikely or undesirable to be considered a possibility. <i>It was unthinkable that John could be dead.</i>
wanting	Not existing; absent. <i>They weren't wanting in confidence.</i>
