## Inalienable as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Inalienable" as an adjective

- *Incapable of being repudiated or transferred to another.*
- *Not subject to forfeiture.*
- *Not subject to being taken away from or given away by the possessor.*

<b><a href="#">absolute</a></b>	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i>An <b>absolute</b> guarantee to respect the nation s authority.</i>
<b>inviolable</b>	Not capable of being violated or infringed. <i>An <b>inviolable</b> rule of chastity.</i>
<b><a href="#">sacrosanct</a></b>	(especially of a principle, place, or routine) regarded as too important or valuable to be interfered with. <i>The individual s right to work has been upheld as <b>sacrosanct</b>.</i>
<b>unalienable</b>	Incapable of being repudiated or transferred to another. <i>Endowed by their Creator with certain <b>unalienable</b> rights.</i>

<b><u>unassailable</u></b>	Without flaws or loopholes. <i>An <b>unassailable</b> lead.</i>
<b>unchallengeable</b>	Not able to be disputed, opposed, or defeated. <i><b>Unchallengeable</b> facts.</i>
<b>unforfeitable</b>	Not subject to forfeiture. <i>An <b>unforfeitable</b> right.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Inalienable" as an adjective

- *The shareholders have the inalienable right to dismiss directors.*

## Associations of "Inalienable" (30 Words)

<b><u>absolute</u></b>	(of powers or rights) not subject to any limitation; unconditional. <i>No one dare challenge her <b>absolute</b> authority.</i>
<b>aggregation</b>	The act of gathering something together. <i>A desktop <b>aggregation</b> app that brings together Facebook Twitter and LinkedIn.</i>
<b><u>belongings</u></b>	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone. <i>She didn't have much baggage with her as most of her <b>belongings</b> had been sent ahead by sea.</i>
<b><u>certain</u></b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>He was <b>certain</b> to fail.</i>
<b>certitude</b>	Absolute certainty or conviction that something is the case. <i>The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b>.</i>
<b>chartered</b>	Hired for the exclusive temporary use of a group of travelers. <i>The town's celebration of its 800th anniversary as a <b>chartered</b> borough.</i>
<b>demonstrable</b>	Necessarily or demonstrably true. <i>The <b>demonstrable</b> injustices of racism.</i>
<b>impregnable</b>	(of a fortified position) unable to be captured or broken into. <i>An <b>impregnable</b> fortress.</i>
<b>incontestable</b>	Not able to be disputed.
<b>incontrovertible</b>	Necessarily or demonstrably true. <i><b>Incontrovertible</b> proof of the defendant's innocence.</i>
<b>indefeasible</b>	Not subject to being lost, annulled, or overturned. <i>An <b>indefeasible</b> claim to the title.</i>

<b>indisputable</b>	Impossible to doubt or dispute. <i><b>Indisputable</b> or sure proof.</i>
<b>infrangible</b>	Difficult or impossible to break or separate into parts. <i><b>Infrangible</b> human rights.</i>
<b><u>invincible</u></b>	Incapable of being overcome or subdued. <i>Her <b>invincible</b> spirit.</i>
<b>inviolable</b>	Never to be broken, infringed, or dishonoured. <i>The Polish German border was <b>inviolable</b>.</i>
<b>invulnerable</b>	Impossible to harm or damage. <i>Gunners raked the beach from <b>invulnerable</b> positions on the cliffs.</i>
<b>larceny</b>	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
<b><u>loot</u></b>	Money. <i>The rooms were stuffed with the <b>loot</b> from Francis's expeditions into Italy.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An act of requiting; returning in kind. <i>A compensation <b>payment</b> of 2500.</i>
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>That hat is my <b>property</b>.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Steal. <i>Bob thinks my suit cost 70 and even then he thinks I was <b>robbed</b>.</i>
<b>robbery</b>	Plundering during riots or in wartime. <i>An armed <b>robbery</b>.</i>
<b><u>sacrosanct</u></b>	Must be kept sacred. <i>The individual's right to work has been upheld as <b>sacrosanct</b>.</i>
<b><u>secure</u></b>	Succeed in obtaining (something), especially with difficulty. <i>His fortune was <b>secure</b>.</i>
<b>steal</b>	An act of stealing something. <i>He claims he can <b>steal</b> a hundred bases this season.</i>
<b><u>sure</u></b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>They thought he had been killed <b>sure</b> enough.</i>
<b>unalienable</b>	Incapable of being repudiated or transferred to another. <i>Endowed by their Creator with certain <b>unalienable</b> rights.</i>
<b><u>unassailable</u></b>	Unable to be attacked, questioned, or defeated. <i>An <b>unassailable</b> lead.</i>
<b>unshakable</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable.
