Synonyms of "Incite" as a verb (47 Words)

actuate	Give an incentive for action. <i>The pendulum actuates an electrical switch.</i>
agitate against	Exert oneself continuously, vigorously, or obtrusively to gain an end or engage in a crusade for a certain cause or person; be an advocate for.
agitate for	Exert oneself continuously, vigorously, or obtrusively to gain an end or engage in a crusade for a certain cause or person; be an advocate for.
arouse	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>Arouse pity.</i>
awaken	Make aware. <i>They were awakened to the sad facts.</i>

<u>convince</u>	Cause (someone) to believe firmly in the truth of something. <i>We had to convince politicians that they needed to do something.</i>
drive on	Travel or be transported in a vehicle.
egg on	Coat with beaten egg.
encourage	Give support, confidence, or hope to (someone). <i>His financial success encouraged him to look for a wife.</i>
<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Excite the neurons.</i>
exert influence on	Have and exercise.
fan the flames of	Strike out (a batter), (of a pitcher).
ferment	Of a substance undergo fermentation. <i>The Middle East is fermenting.</i>
foment	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>His legs should be fomented.</i>
<u>fuel</u>	Provide with fuel. <i>The tanker fueled in Bahrain.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>I just don't get him.</i>
<u>goad</u>	Goad or provoke as by constant criticism. <i>The cowboys goaded their cattle across the meadows.</i>
<u>ignite</u>	Cause to start burning; subject to fire or great heat. <i>Great heat can ignite almost any dry matter.</i>
impel	Cause to move forward with force. <i>Financial difficulties impelled him to desperate measures.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Cause (radioactivity) by bombardment with radiation. <i>She was 11 days overdue when labour was induced.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were inflamed with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
influence	Have and exert influence or effect. <i>Government regulations can influence behaviour but often without changing underlying values and motivations.</i>
inspire	Fill (someone) with the urge or ability to do or feel something, especially to do something creative. <i>The film was successful enough to inspire a sequel.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Provoke or stir up. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>

kindle	Set (something) on fire. <i>The young man kindled at once.</i>
make	Compel or make somebody or something to act in a certain way. <i>This makes a fine introduction.</i>
motivate	Give an incentive for action. <i>He was primarily motivated by the desire for profit.</i>
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. <i>His family moved to London when he was a child.</i> (of a situation or event) provide a sound reason for (someone) to do something.
persuade	<i>He did everything he could to persuade the police that he was the robber.</i>
press	Press from a plastic. <i>Press a record.</i>
prevail upon	Use persuasion successfully.
prompt	Cause someone to take a course of action. <i>The violence prompted a wave of refugees to flee the country.</i>
propel	Drive or push something forwards. <i>A rocket propelled grenade launcher.</i>
provoke	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can provoke you into working harder.</i>
push	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>She pushed her way through the crowded streets.</i>
set off	Set to a certain position or cause to operate correctly.
spark off	Emit or produce sparks.
spur on	Give heart or courage to.
stimulate	Act as a stimulant. <i>The book stimulated her imagination.</i>
stir up	Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of.
stoke up	Stir up or tend; of a fire.
trigger	Release or pull the trigger on. <i>Trigger a reaction.</i>
urge	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>I urged him to finish his studies.</i>
waken	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>She wakened the child and dressed her.</i>

Defeat thoroughly.

work up

Move in an agitated manner.

Associations of "Incite" (30 Words)

agitate	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>They agitated for a reversal of the decision.</i>
agitative	Causing or tending to cause anger or resentment.
arousal	Mutual sexual fondling prior to sexual intercourse. <i>Sexual arousal in dreams is common.</i>
arouse	Cause to be alert and energetic. <i>The letter aroused in him a sense of urgency.</i>
<u>backlash</u>	A strong negative reaction by a large number of people, especially to a social or political development. <i>Typical gearbox backlash in these systems is 2.</i>
<u>drive</u>	Hitting a golf ball off of a tee with a driver. <i>The amplifier drives the tube.</i>

elate	Make (someone) ecstatically happy. <i>While the wealth of wildlife elated me it unnerved me as well.</i>
encourage	Spur on. <i>His financial success encouraged him to look for a wife.</i>
<u>energize</u>	Cause to be alert and energetic. <i>People were energized by his ideas.</i>
enkindle	Cause to start burning. <i>Fresh remembrance of vexation must still enkindle rage.</i>
<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The ability to excite interest in others.</i>
foment	Try to stir up public opinion. <i>His legs should be fomented.</i>
incitement	Needed encouragement. <i>The incitement of mutiny.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Succeed in persuading or leading (someone) to do something. <i>None of these measures induced a change of policy.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The torches inflame the night to the eastward.</i>
inspire	Fill with revolutionary ideas. <i>Their past record does not inspire confidence.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Provoke or stir up. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Cause (a procedure) to be carried out. <i>He invoked the law that would save him.</i>
<u>irritation</u>	The state of feeling annoyed, impatient, or slightly angry. <i>Any food produced irritation of the stomach.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>He said he would motivate funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
<u>propel</u>	Cause to move forward with force. <i>The boat is propelled by using a very long paddle.</i>
provocation	Something that incites or provokes; a means of arousing or stirring to action. <i>The result was a provocation of vigorous investigation.</i>
<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Rachel refused to be provoked.</i>
<u>recoil</u>	The action of recoiling. <i>He recoiled in horror.</i>

rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>His evasiveness roused my curiosity.</i>
spur	Urge a horse forward by digging one s spurs into its sides. <i>Governments cut interest rates to spur demand.</i>
stimulate	Provide the needed stimulus for. <i>The book stimulated her imagination.</i>
stir	Stir feelings in. <i>He even stirred himself to play an encore.</i>
<u>unrest</u>	A feeling of disturbance and dissatisfaction in a person. <i>Years of industrial unrest.</i>
urge	Push for something. <i>I urged him to finish his studies.</i>
