- *Of waves having no stable definite or stable phase relation.*
- *(of a person) unable to speak intelligibly.*
- *(of spoken or written language) expressed in an incomprehensible or confusing way; unclear.*
- *Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently.*

| <b><u>irrational</u></b> | Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2.<br><i><b>Irrational</b> numbers.</i> |
| <b>jumbled</b>           | In utter disorder.  |
| <b>mixed up</b>          | Involving or composed of different races.   |
| <b>muddled</b>           | Confused and vague; used especially of thinking.<br><i>Such a view reflects <b>muddled</b> thinking.</i>  |
| <b>raving</b>            | Used to emphasize a particular quality.<br><i>Have you gone <b>raving</b> mad.</i>  |
| <b>scrambled</b>         | Thrown together in a disorderly fashion.<br><i>A <b>scrambled</b> plan of action.</i>   |
| <b>tongue-tied</b>       | Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently.   |
| <b><u>unclear</u></b>    | Not easily deciphered.<br><i>Their future remains <b>unclear</b>.</i>   |

| <b>distributed</b>         | (of a term) used to include every individual of the class to which it refers.<br><i>The figures of syllogisms all have properly <b>distributed</b> middle terms.</i> |

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| <b>garbled</b>       | (of a message, sound, or transmission) confused and distorted; unclear.<br><i>I got a <b>garbled</b> set of directions.</i>  |
| <b>gibber</b>        | Speak rapidly and unintelligibly, typically through fear or shock.<br><i>They shrieked and <b>gibbered</b> as flames surrounded them.</i>                              |
| <b>gibberish</b>     | Unintelligible talking.<br><i>He talks <b>gibberish</b>.</i>   |
| <b>illogical</b>     | Lacking orderly continuity.<br><i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>  |
| <b>irrational</b>    | An irrational number or quantity a surd.<br><i><b>Irrational</b> fears.</i>  |
| <b>jumble</b>        | Be all mixed up or jumbled together.<br><i>She <b>jumbles</b> the words when she is supposed to write a sentence.</i>  |

| <b>nonsense</b>      | Something ridiculously impractical or ill-advised.<br><i>She s a strong woman who stands no <b>nonsense</b>.</i>   |
| <b>opaque</b>        | An opaque thing.<br><i><b>Opaque</b> to X rays.</i>  |
| <b>palaver</b>       | An improvised conference between two groups, typically those without a shared language or culture.<br><i>Getting into each building was a bit of a <b>palaver</b>.</i> |
| <b>prattle</b>       | Idle or foolish and irrelevant talk.<br><i>Do you intend to keep up this childish <b>prattle</b>.</i>  |
| <b>scattered</b>     | (of a person) distracted or disorganized.<br><i>A <b>scattered</b> clifftop community.</i>   |
| <b>separated</b>     | Separated at the joint.<br><i>Thought of herself as alone and <b>separated</b> from the others.</i>  |
| <b>superstitious</b> | Having or showing a belief in superstitions.<br><i>Finally realized that the horror he felt was <b>superstitious</b> in origin.</i>                                    |

**unintelligible** Poorly articulated or enunciated, or drowned by noise.  
*Dolphin sounds are **unintelligible** to humans.*

**unreasonable** Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness.  
*An **unreasonable** request.*

**untenable** (especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection.  
*This argument is clearly **untenable**.*
