### **Income as a Noun**

#### Definitions of "Income" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "income" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time.
- Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments.





## Synonyms of "Income" as a noun (7 Words)

earnings	The excess of revenues over outlays in a given period of time (including depreciation and other non-cash expenses. They saved a quarter of all their <b>earnings</b> .
emolument	A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office. A clause in the U S constitution prevents sitting legislators from receiving <b>emolument</b> s from their own votes.
pay	The money paid to someone for regular work. An entitlement to sickness <b>pay</b> .
remuneration	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.
<u>salary</u>	Something that remunerates. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<u>stipend</u>	A sum of money allotted on a regular basis; usually for some specific purpose.



#### wages

A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. *The wages* of sin is death.



## Usage Examples of "Income" as a noun

- *He has a nice home and an adequate income.*
- Figures showed an overall increase in income this year.





# Associations of "Income" (30 Words)

bonus	A sum of money added to a person's wages as a reward for good performance. <i>Big Christmas <b>bonus</b>es.</i>
buyer	A person who makes a purchase.
<u>cash</u>	Exchange for cash. I <b>cash</b> ed the check as soon as it arrived in the mail.
confiscation	The action of taking or seizing someone's property with authority; seizure. <i>A court ordered the <b>confiscation</b> of her property.</i>
customs	The place at a port, airport, or frontier where officials check incoming goods, travellers, or luggage. <i>Cocaine seizures by</i> <b>customs</b> have risen this year.
<u>deposit</u>	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. Beds where salt is <b>deposit</b> ed by the tide.



dividend	An individual s share of a dividend. Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividend</b> s.
<u>earn</u>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>The dollars can be placed on deposit and earn interest.</i>
<u>earned</u>	Gained or acquired; especially through merit or as a result of effort or action. A well <b>earned</b> reputation for honesty.
earnings	Something that remunerates. Export <b>earnings</b> .
emolument	Compensation received by virtue of holding an office or having employment (usually in the form of wages or fees. <i>The directors emoluments.</i>
gross	Produce or earn an amount of money as gross profit or income. A <b>gross</b> exaggeration.
lucre	Money, especially when regarded as sordid or distasteful or gained in a dishonourable way. Officials getting their hands grubby with filthy <b>lucre</b> .
overpayment	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayment</b>s.</i>
paycheck	A check issued in payment of wages or salary.
property	Shares or investments in property. The president was concerned about the <b>property</b> across from the White House.
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural.
redistribute	Distribute anew. <b>Redistribute</b> the troops more strategically.
redistribution	The distribution of something in a different way, typically to achieve greater social equality. Social justice required <b>redistribution</b> of wealth.
remuneration	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.
<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. When the <b>revenue</b> makes a demand for tax that demand is implicitly backed by the powers of the state.
reward	Bestow honor or rewards upon. The emotional <b>reward</b> s of being a carer.



<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. The Chinese system <b>salary</b> the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.
<u>subsidy</u>	A grant or contribution of money. The rail service now operates without <b>subsidy</b> .
tariff	Charge a tariff. <b>Tariff</b> imported goods.
<u>tax</u>	Pay tax on something especially a vehicle. <i>Tax cuts.</i>
taxation	Government income due to taxation. The progressive nature of <b>taxation</b> .
vat	Place or treat in a vat. The grapes are <b>vat</b> ted for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.
wage	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns. Napoleon and Hitler <b>wage</b> d war against all of Europe.
wealth	A plentiful supply of a particular desirable thing. Great <b>wealth</b> is not a sign of great intelligence.
