## **Income as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Income" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “income” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time.*
- *Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments.*



## Synonyms of "Income" as a noun (7 Words)

- earnings** The excess of revenues over outlays in a given period of time (including depreciation and other non-cash expenses).  
*They saved a quarter of all their **earnings**.*
- emolument** A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office.  
*A clause in the U S constitution prevents sitting legislators from receiving **emoluments** from their own votes.*
- pay** The money paid to someone for regular work.  
*An entitlement to sickness **pay**.*
- remuneration** The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses.  
*Adequate **remuneration** for his work.*
- [salary](#) Something that remunerates.  
*He received a **salary** of 24 000.*
- [stipend](#) A sum of money allotted on a regular basis; usually for some specific purpose.



**wages**

A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing.  
*The **wages** of sin is death.*



**Usage Examples of "Income" as a noun**

- *He has a nice home and an adequate income.*
- *Figures showed an overall increase in income this year.*



## Associations of "Income" (30 Words)

<b>bonus</b>	A sum of money added to a person's wages as a reward for good performance. <i>Big Christmas <b>bonuses</b>.</i>
<b>buyer</b>	A person who makes a purchase.
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>I <b>cash</b>ed the check as soon as it arrived in the mail.</i>
<b>confiscation</b>	The action of taking or seizing someone's property with authority; seizure. <i>A court ordered the <b>confiscation</b> of her property.</i>
<b>customs</b>	The place at a port, airport, or frontier where officials check incoming goods, travellers, or luggage. <i>Cocaine seizures by <b>customs</b> have risen this year.</i>
<b>deposit</b>	A facility where things can be deposited for storage or safekeeping. <i>Beds where salt is <b>deposited</b> by the tide.</i>

<b>dividend</b>	An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividends</b>.</i>
<b>earn</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>The dollars can be placed on deposit and <b>earn</b> interest.</i>
<b>earned</b>	Gained or acquired; especially through merit or as a result of effort or action. <i>A well <b>earned</b> reputation for honesty.</i>
<b>earnings</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>Export <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>emolument</b>	Compensation received by virtue of holding an office or having employment (usually in the form of wages or fees). <i>The directors <b>emoluments</b>.</i>
<b>gross</b>	Produce or earn an amount of money as gross profit or income. <i>A <b>gross</b> exaggeration.</i>
<b>lucre</b>	Money, especially when regarded as sordid or distasteful or gained in a dishonourable way. <i>Officials getting their hands grubby with filthy <b>lucre</b>.</i>
<b>overpayment</b>	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayments</b>.</i>
<b>paycheck</b>	A check issued in payment of wages or salary.
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>The president was concerned about the <b>property</b> across from the White House.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>redistribute</b>	Distribute anew. <i><b>Redistribute</b> the troops more strategically.</i>
<b>redistribution</b>	The distribution of something in a different way, typically to achieve greater social equality. <i>Social justice required <b>redistribution</b> of wealth.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<b>revenue</b>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>When the <b>revenue</b> makes a demand for tax that demand is implicitly backed by the powers of the state.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>The emotional <b>rewards</b> of being a carer.</i>



<b>salary</b>	Pay a salary to. <i>The Chinese system <b>salary</b> the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.</i>
<b>subsidy</b>	A grant or contribution of money. <i>The rail service now operates without <b>subsidy</b>.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	Charge a tariff. <i><b>Tariff</b> imported goods.</i>
<b>tax</b>	Pay tax on something especially a vehicle. <i><b>Tax</b> cuts.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>The progressive nature of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>vat</b>	Place or treat in a vat. <i>The grapes are <b>vatted</b> for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.</i>
<b>wage</b>	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns). <i>Napoleon and Hitler <b>waged</b> war against all of Europe.</i>
<b>wealth</b>	A plentiful supply of a particular desirable thing. <i>Great <b>wealth</b> is not a sign of great intelligence.</i>
