Associations of "Incongruent" (30 Words)

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The incidents that followed bordered on the absurd.</i>
absurdity	The quality or state of being ridiculous or wildly unreasonable. <i>Duncan laughed at the absurdity of the situation.</i>
foolish	Lacking good sense or judgement; unwise. <i>He was foolish enough to confide in her.</i>
garbled	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>I got a garbled set of directions.</i>
illogical	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
immoral	Not adhering to ethical or moral principles. <i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i>
impolitic	Not politic. <i>It was impolitic to pay the slightest tribute to the enemy.</i>
inadvisable	Not prudent or wise; not recommended. <i>It would be inadvisable to involve more than one architect.</i>
inappropriate	Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i>Inappropriate shoes for a walk on the beach.</i>
incongruity	The quality of disagreeing; being unsuitable and inappropriate. <i>The incongruity of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.</i>
incongruous	Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of something. <i>The duffel coat looked incongruous with the black dress she wore underneath.</i>
indecent	Offending against sexual mores in conduct or appearance. <i>A bathing suit considered indecent by local standards.</i>

<u>indecorous</u>	Not in keeping with good taste and propriety; improper. <i>A pub crawl with sundry indecorous adventures.</i>
indelicate	In violation of good taste even verging on the indecent. <i>Forgive me asking an indelicate question but how are you off for money.</i>
inexpedient	Not suitable or advisable. <i>An inexpedient tactic.</i>
injudicious	Showing very poor judgement; unwise. <i>An injudicious measure.</i>
<u>invalid</u>	Injure permanently. <i>Invalid reasoning.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>
<u>ludicrous</u>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
ridiculous	Deserving or inviting derision or mockery; absurd. <i>That ridiculous tartan cap.</i>
salience	The state of being salient. <i>The political salience of religion has a considerable impact.</i>
<u>superstitious</u>	Showing ignorance of the laws of nature and faith in magic or chance. <i>Many superstitious beliefs and practices are connected with sneezing.</i>
<u>unbecoming</u>	(especially of clothing or a colour) not flattering. <i>Language unbecoming to a lady.</i>
<u>unfit</u>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>Drunk and unfit for service.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
unseemly	(of behaviour or actions) not proper or appropriate. <i>An unseemly squabble.</i>
<u>unsound</u>	Physically unsound or diseased. <i>This line of argument is unsound.</i>
<u>unsuitable</u>	Not conducive to good moral development. <i>The display is unsuitable for young children.</i>
