#### **immaterial**

Not consisting of matter.  
*Ghosts and other **immaterial** entities.*

#### **incidental**

Not of prime or central importance.  
***Incidental** expenses.*

#### **inconsequent**

Not connected or following logically; irrelevant.  
*His work seems trivial and **inconsequential**.*

#### **inessential**

Not basic or fundamental.  
***Inessential** information.*

### insignificant

Too small or unimportant to be worth consideration.

***Insignificant** sounds.*

### irrelevant

Not connected with or relevant to something.

*Theory can sometimes be hastily dismissed as **irrelevant** to the classroom.*

**neither here nor there** Being here now.

**of little account** Small and of little importance.

**of little consequence** Low in stature; not tall.

**of little importance** Small and of little importance.

**of no account** Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.

**of no consequence** Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.

**of no importance** Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.

**of no moment** Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of.

### unimportant

Lacking in importance or significance.

*The question seems **unimportant**.*

<b>bauble</b>	A mock scepter carried by a court jester. <i>People in quest of honours are wasting time and effort to secure <b>baubles</b>.</i>
<b>drizzle</b>	(in cooking) a thin stream of a liquid ingredient trickled over food. <i>It s started to <b>drizzle</b>.</i>
<b>flimsy</b>	Lacking substance or significance. <i>A <b>flimsy</b> table.</i>
<b>frivolous</b>	(of a person) carefree and superficial. <i><b>Frivolous</b> ribbons and lacy frills.</i>

<b>inconsiderable</b>	Unimportant or insignificant. <i>A not <b>inconsiderable</b> amount of money.</i>
<b>insignificant</b>	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>An <b>insignificant</b> sum of money.</i>
<b>insubstantial</b>	Not having physical existence. <i><b>Insubstantial</b> evidence.</i>
<b>lowly</b>	Inferior in rank or status. <i>Of humble or <b>lowly</b> birth.</i>
<b>meanness</b>	Unkindness, spitefulness, or unfairness. <i>The <b>meanness</b> of that existence.</i>
<b>mini</b>	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A <b>mini</b> dress.</i>
<b>minor</b>	The minor leagues in baseball or American football. <i><b>Minor</b> children.</i>
<b>negligible</b>	So small as to be meaningless; insignificant. <i>The effect was <b>negligible</b>.</i>
<b>nominal</b>	Expressed in terms of current prices or figures, without making allowance for changes over time. <i><b>Nominal</b> interest rates.</i>
<b>paltry</b>	(of an amount) very small or meagre. <i>A <b>paltry</b> wage.</i>
<b>parsimonious</b>	Excessively unwilling to spend. <i><b>Parsimonious</b> thrift relieved by few generous impulses.</i>
<b>peccadillo</b>	A relatively minor fault or sin. <i>The sexual <b>peccadilloes</b> of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i>
<b>pettiness</b>	Lack of generosity in trifling matters. <i>Try to overlook insults and <b>pettinesses</b>.</i>
<b>petty</b>	Of secondary or lesser importance, rank, or scale; minor. <i><b>Petty</b> theft.</i>
<b>picayune</b>	Small and of little importance. <i>Giving a police officer a free meal may be against the law but it seems to be a <b>picayune</b> infraction.</i>
<b>piddling</b>	Pathetically trivial; trifling. <i><b>Piddling</b> little questions.</i>
<b>puerile</b>	Of or characteristic of a child. <i><b>Puerile</b> jokes.</i>

<b>quaver</b>	A note having the time value of an eighth of a semibreve or half a crotchet, represented by a large dot with a hooked stem. <i>I m not safe here am I she said in a <b>quavering</b> voice.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Raze or destroy (a fortification). <i>A <b>slight</b> increase.</i>
<b>stickler</b>	A person who insists on a certain quality or type of behaviour. <i>A <b>stickler</b> for promptness.</i>
<b><u>tenuous</u></b>	Having thin consistency. <i>A <b>tenuous</b> fluid.</i>
<b>trifling</b>	Unimportant or trivial. <i>A <b>trifling</b> sum.</i>
<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>A <b>trivial</b> mind.</i>
<b>undersized</b>	Of less than the usual size. <i>The <b>undersized</b> cubs may not survive the winter.</i>
<b>undistinguished</b>	Not special in any way; lacking distinction. <i>An <b>undistinguished</b> career.</i>
<b><u>unimportant</u></b>	Not important. <i>The question seems <b>unimportant</b>.</i>
