## **Incredulous as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Incredulous" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “incredulous” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person or their manner) unwilling or unable to believe something.*
- *Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving.*



## Synonyms of "Incredulous" as an adjective (5 Words)

- disbelieving** Feeling or expressing disbelief.  
*The **disbelieving** look in her eyes.*
- doubtful** Improbable.  
*It is **doubtful** whether these schemes have any lasting effect.*
- dubious** Of questionable value.  
***Dubious** about agreeing to go.*
- unbelieving** Not believing someone or something; incredulous.  
*Drew could only stand there wide eyed and **unbelieving**.*
- unconvinced** Lacking conviction.  
*Parisians remain **unconvinced** that the project will be approved.*

## Associations of "Incredulous" (30 Words)

<b>agnostic</b>	Relating to agnostics or agnosticism. <i>Our industry is moving towards a device <b>agnostic</b> model.</i>
<b><u>askance</u></b>	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>Her eyes with their misted <b>askance</b> look.</i>
<b><u>askew</u></b>	Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton. <i>The judging was a bit <b>askew</b>.</i>
<b><u>atheist</u></b>	A person who disbelieves or lacks belief in the existence of God or gods. <i><b>Atheist</b> leanings.</i>

<b><u>cynical</u></b>	Believing that people are motivated purely by self-interest; distrustful of human sincerity or integrity. <i>A <b>cynical</b> manipulation of public opinion.</i>
<b><u>disbelief</u></b>	Inability or refusal to accept that something is true or real. <i>Laura shook her head in <b>disbelief</b>.</i>
<b><u>distrust</u></b>	Doubt the honesty or reliability of; regard with suspicion. <i>The public s <b>distrust</b> of politicians.</i>
<b><u>doubt</u></b>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>Who can <b>doubt</b> the value and necessity of these services.</i>
<b>doubtful</b>	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>Of <b>doubtful</b> legality.</i>
<b><u>dubious</u></b>	Not convinced. <i>Extremely <b>dubious</b> assumptions.</i>
<b>freethinker</b>	A person who rejects accepted opinions, especially those concerning religious belief.
<b>incredulity</b>	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<b><u>leery</u></b>	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>A city <b>leery</b> of gang violence.</i>
<b>misgiving</b>	A feeling of doubt or apprehension about the outcome or consequences of something. <i>I felt a sense of <b>misgiving</b> at the prospect of retirement.</i>
<b><u>pessimist</u></b>	A person who tends to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen. <i>He finds solace in the writings of <b>pessimist</b> philosophers.</i>
<b>question</b>	Ask someone questions especially in an official context. <i>He was ready to pop the <b>question</b>.</i>
<b><u>questionable</u></b>	Doubtful as regards truth or validity. <i>His <b>questionable</b> financial deals.</i>
<b>questioning</b>	The raising of a doubt about or objection to something. <i>This situation should prompt <b>questioning</b>.</i>
<b>regret</b>	Express with regret. <i>He had to decline to his <b>regret</b>.</i>
<b>sceptic</b>	An ancient or modern philosopher who denies the possibility of knowledge, or even rational belief, in some sphere.
<b>sceptical</b>	Marked by or given to doubt. <i>The public were deeply <b>sceptical</b> about some of the proposals.</i>

<b>sidelong</b>	Situated at or extending to the side- Tennyson. <i>Darting eyes looking <b>sidelong</b> out of a wizened face.</i>
<b>skeptic</b>	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
<b><u>skeptical</u></b>	Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion. <i>A <b>skeptical</b> attitude.</i>
<b>skepticism</b>	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge.
<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>I was <b>surprised</b> at his statement.</i>
<b><u>suspicious</u></b>	Having or showing a cautious distrust of someone or something. <i>Police were called when staff became <b>suspicious</b>.</i>
<b>suspiciously</b>	In a way that arouses suspicion or distrust. <i>Women have been eyed <b>suspiciously</b> by the Party.</i>
<b>unbelief</b>	Lack of religious belief; an absence of faith. <i>The distinction between doubt and <b>unbelief</b> is valid and useful.</i>
<b><u>uncertainty</u></b>	The state of being unsure of something. <i>Times of <b>uncertainty</b> and danger.</i>
