Incredulous as an Adjective

Definitions of "Incredulous" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “incredulous” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person or their manner) unwilling or unable to believe something.*
- *Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving.*



Synonyms of "Incredulous" as an adjective (5 Words)

- disbelieving** Feeling or expressing disbelief.
*The **disbelieving** look in her eyes.*
- doubtful** Improbable.
*It is **doubtful** whether these schemes have any lasting effect.*
- dubious** Of questionable value.
***Dubious** about agreeing to go.*
- unbelieving** Not believing someone or something; incredulous.
*Drew could only stand there wide eyed and **unbelieving**.*
- unconvinced** Lacking conviction.
*Parisians remain **unconvinced** that the project will be approved.*

agnostic	Relating to agnostics or agnosticism. <i>Our industry is moving towards a device agnostic model.</i>
<u>askance</u>	Directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy- Elizabeth Bowen. <i>Her eyes with their misted askance look.</i>
<u>askew</u>	Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton. <i>The judging was a bit askew.</i>
<u>atheist</u>	A person who disbelieves or lacks belief in the existence of God or gods. <i>Atheist leanings.</i>

<u>cynical</u>	Believing that people are motivated purely by self-interest; distrustful of human sincerity or integrity. <i>A cynical manipulation of public opinion.</i>
<u>disbelief</u>	Inability or refusal to accept that something is true or real. <i>Laura shook her head in disbelief.</i>
<u>distrust</u>	Doubt the honesty or reliability of; regard with suspicion. <i>The public s distrust of politicians.</i>
<u>doubt</u>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>Who can doubt the value and necessity of these services.</i>
doubtful	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>Of doubtful legality.</i>
<u>dubious</u>	Not convinced. <i>Extremely dubious assumptions.</i>
freethinker	A person who rejects accepted opinions, especially those concerning religious belief.
incredulity	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i>
<u>leery</u>	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>A city leery of gang violence.</i>
misgiving	A feeling of doubt or apprehension about the outcome or consequences of something. <i>I felt a sense of misgiving at the prospect of retirement.</i>
<u>pessimist</u>	A person who tends to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen. <i>He finds solace in the writings of pessimist philosophers.</i>
question	Ask someone questions especially in an official context. <i>He was ready to pop the question.</i>
<u>questionable</u>	Doubtful as regards truth or validity. <i>His questionable financial deals.</i>
questioning	The raising of a doubt about or objection to something. <i>This situation should prompt questioning.</i>
regret	Express with regret. <i>He had to decline to his regret.</i>
sceptic	An ancient or modern philosopher who denies the possibility of knowledge, or even rational belief, in some sphere.
sceptical	Marked by or given to doubt. <i>The public were deeply sceptical about some of the proposals.</i>

sidelong	Situated at or extending to the side- Tennyson. <i>Darting eyes looking sidelong out of a wizened face.</i>
skeptic	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
<u>skeptical</u>	Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion. <i>A skeptical attitude.</i>
skepticism	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge.
surprise	Cause to be surprised. <i>I was surprised at his statement.</i>
<u>suspicious</u>	Having or showing a cautious distrust of someone or something. <i>Police were called when staff became suspicious.</i>
suspiciously	In a way that arouses suspicion or distrust. <i>Women have been eyed suspiciously by the Party.</i>
unbelief	Lack of religious belief; an absence of faith. <i>The distinction between doubt and unbelief is valid and useful.</i>
<u>uncertainty</u>	The state of being unsure of something. <i>Times of uncertainty and danger.</i>
