Definitions of "Incur" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “incur” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Receive a specified treatment (abstract).*
- *Become subject to (something unwelcome or unpleasant) as a result of one's own behaviour or actions.*
- *Make oneself subject to; bring upon oneself; become liable to.*



Synonyms of "Incur" as a verb (10 Words)

- bring upon oneself** Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.
- experience** Undergo or live through a difficult experience.
*An opportunity to **experience** the excitement of New York.*
- expose oneself to** Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position.
- find** Get or find back recover the use of.
***Find** the product of two numbers.*
- get** Take vengeance on or get even.
*I might be **getting** the flu.*
- lay oneself open to** Impose as a duty, burden, or punishment.
- obtain** Be valid, applicable, or true.
*Adequate insurance cover is difficult to **obtain**.*
- receive** Receive a specified treatment abstract.
*He **received** Christ.*
- suffer** Undergo or suffer.
*He **suffered** intense pain.*

sustain Bear (the weight of an object) without breaking or falling.
*She alone **sustained** her family.*

acquired	Gotten through environmental forces. <i>Acquired characteristics such as a suntan or a broken nose cannot be passed on.</i>
acquirement	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i>
acquisition	A purchase of one company by another. <i>The legacy will be used for new acquisitions.</i>
attainable	Able to be attained; achievable. <i>Choose an attainable goal.</i>
consequential	Important; significant. <i>A loss of confidence and a consequential withdrawal of funds.</i>
derive	Base a concept on an extension or modification of (another concept). <i>The word man is derived from the Sanskrit manas.</i>
earn	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>Through the years she has earned affection and esteem.</i>
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>The land could fetch over a million pounds.</i>
gain	Derive a benefit from. <i>The peace movement gained momentum.</i>
glean	Gather (leftover grain) after a harvest. <i>Objects gleaned from local markets.</i>
have	Have sex with. <i>The only girl who would have him was the miller s daughter.</i>
invulnerable	Immune to attack; impregnable. <i>No state in the region is now invulnerable to attack by another.</i>

obtain	Come into possession of. <i>How did you obtain the visa.</i>
obtainable	Able to be obtained. <i>Customers financial details are easily obtainable.</i>
<u>own</u>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>Do your own thing.</i>
permission	An official document giving authorization. <i>They had entered the country without permission.</i>
picking	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first picking of berries to the market.</i>
possession	A mania restricted to one thing or idea. <i>He remains in full possession of his sanity.</i>
preferment	The act of making accusations. <i>After ordination preferment was fast.</i>
procure	Obtain (someone) as a prostitute for another person. <i>He procured extra cigarettes even though they were rationed.</i>
<u>procurement</u>	The action or occupation of acquiring military equipment and supplies. <i>Defence procurement.</i>
reap	Cut or gather (a crop or harvest). <i>Farmers agreed to continue reaping the land by traditional means.</i>
<u>reassure</u>	Cause to feel sure; give reassurance to. <i>Joachim reassured him that he was needed.</i>
receive	Receive as a retribution or punishment. <i>He received Christ.</i>
<u>regain</u>	Obtain possession or use of (something, typically a quality or ability) again after losing it. <i>They were unable to regain their boats.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Succeed in obtaining (something), especially with difficulty. <i>A secure foundation.</i>
uninjured	(of a person or part of the body) not harmed or damaged. <i>They escaped uninjured when their homes were hit.</i>
wangle	An instance of accomplishing something by scheming or trickery. <i>I think we should be able to wangle it so that you can start tomorrow.</i>
