unseemly (of behaviour or actions) not proper or appropriate.

untoward Contrary to your interests or welfare.

Made a place for themselves under the most **untoward** conditions.

unvirtuous Not having or showing high moral standards.

If our actions are **unvirtuous** the results will be negative.
