- *Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society.*

Synonyms of "Indecorous" as an adjective (15 Words)

immodest	Having or showing an exaggerated opinion of your importance, ability, etc. <i>Brash immodest boasting.</i>
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i>
improper	Not suitable or right or appropriate. <i>Slightly improper to dine alone with a married man.</i>
indecent	Not appropriate or fitting. <i>They leaped on the suggestion with indecent haste.</i>

indelicate	Lacking propriety and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>An indelicate proposition.</i>
indiscreet	Lacking discretion; injudicious. <i>Her behavior was indiscreet at the very best.</i>
loose	Not affixed. <i>She slipped into a loose T shirt.</i>
shameless	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>His shameless hypocrisy.</i>
unbecoming	(especially of clothing or a colour) not flattering. <i>It was unbecoming for a university to do anything so crass as advertising its wares.</i>
uncomely	Not attractive (typically used of a woman). <i>She was nineteen and not uncomely.</i>
undignified	Lacking dignity. <i>An undignified exit.</i>
unseemly	(of behaviour or actions) not proper or appropriate. <i>Unseemly to use profanity.</i>
untoward	Contrary to your interests or welfare. <i>Made a place for themselves under the most untoward conditions.</i>
unvirtuous	Not having or showing high moral standards. <i>If our actions are unvirtuous the results will be negative.</i>
wanton	Occurring without motivation or provocation- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>Where wanton ivy twines.</i>

coarse	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. <i>A coarse woollen cloth.</i>

commoner	(at some British universities) an undergraduate who does not have a scholarship. <i>A commoner s gown.</i>
earthy	Of or consisting of or resembling earth. <i>An earthy sense of humor.</i>
eyesore	Something very ugly and offensive. <i>The office crumbled into an eyesore.</i>
garish	Tastelessly showy. <i>Garish colors.</i>
gaudy	(used especially of clothes) marked by conspicuous display. <i>Silver bows and gaudy ribbons.</i>
impolite	Not having or showing good manners; rude. <i>It would have been impolite to refuse.</i>
improper	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i>An improper suggestion.</i>
impropriety	An improper demeanor. <i>She was scandalized at the impropriety of the question.</i>
inappropriate	Not suitable or proper in the circumstances. <i>Noise seems inappropriate at a time of sadness.</i>
indecent	Offending against sexual mores in conduct or appearance. <i>Was buried with indecent haste.</i>
indelicate	Lacking propriety and good taste in manners and conduct. <i>Forgive me asking an indelicate question but how are you off for money.</i>
licentious	Lacking moral discipline; especially sexually unrestrained. <i>Coarse and licentious men.</i>
lurid	Ghastly pale. <i>Lurid details of the accident.</i>
obscene	Designed to incite to indecency or lust-Margaret Mead. <i>Obscene telephone calls.</i>
obscenity	An offensive or indecent word or phrase. <i>A stream of invective and obscenity.</i>
plebeian	Of or belonging to the commoners of ancient Rome. <i>His square plebeian nose.</i>
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>The war came as a very rude awakening.</i>

<u>saucy</u>	Sexually suggestive in a light-hearted and humorous way. <i>The beret was perched at a saucy angle on her blonde hair.</i>
superficiality	Lack of depth of knowledge or thought or feeling. <i>He ruthlessly exposes the superficiality of 1980s culture.</i>
<u>unattractive</u>	Lacking beauty or charm. <i>As unattractive as most mining regions.</i>
<u>unbecoming</u>	(especially of clothing or a colour) not flattering. <i>Language unbecoming to a lady.</i>
uncouth	(of a place) wild, remote, or spartan. <i>His uncouth cell in Fleet prison.</i>
<u>unfit</u>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>Unfit for human consumption.</i>
unseemly	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i>An unseemly squabble.</i>
<u>unsuitable</u>	Not capable of being applied. <i>A solvent unsuitable for use on wood surfaces.</i>
wicked	Morally bad in principle or practice. <i>Under wicked fire from the enemy's guns.</i>
