### Definitions of "Indeed" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “indeed” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Used to introduce a further and stronger or more surprising point.*
- *(used as an interjection) an expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc.*
- *Used to emphasize a statement or response confirming something already suggested.*
- *Used in a response to express interest, surprise, or contempt.*
- *An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection.*
- *In truth (often tends to intensify).*
- *Used to emphasize a description.*
- *Expressing interest of an ironic kind with repetition of a question just asked.*

<b>eminently</b>	To a notable degree; very. <i>An <b>eminently</b> readable textbook.</i>
<u><a href="#">emphatically</a></u>	Without doubt; clearly. <i>No way he said <b>emphatically</b>.</i>
<b>especially</b>	In a special manner. <i>A new song written <b>especially</b> for Jonathan.</i>
<u><a href="#">exactly</a></u>	In exact terms; without vagueness. <i>He was doing precisely or <b>exactly</b> what she had told him to do.</i>
<u><a href="#">exceedingly</a></u>	To an extreme degree. <i>The team played <b>exceedingly</b> well.</i>
<b>exceptionally</b>	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The weather was <b>exceptionally</b> mild for the time of the year.</i>

<b>extra</b>	In addition. <i>Installation will cost about 60 <b>extra</b>.</i>
<b>extraordinarily</b>	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>It will be an <b>extraordinarily</b> painful step to negotiate.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i><b>Extremely</b> interesting.</i>
<b>for sure</b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely.
<b>highly</b>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>Does not think <b>highly</b> of his writing.</i>
<b>immensely</b>	To a great extent; extremely. <i>The president was <b>immensely</b> popular.</i>
<b>in fact</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in point of fact</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in reality</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in the extreme</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in truth</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>indubitably</b>	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and <b>indubitably</b> apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
<b>mightily</b>	(Southern regional intensive) very; to a great degree. <i>This little town has contributed <b>mightily</b> to the life of the nation.</i>
<b>naturally</b>	By nature. <i><b>Naturally</b> curly hair.</i>
<b>nay</b>	No. <i><b>Nay</b> I must not think thus.</i>
<b>of course</b>	As might be expected.
<b>outstandingly</b>	Exceptionally. <i><b>Outstandingly</b> beautiful gardens.</i>
<b>particularly</b>	Used to single out a subject to which a statement is especially applicable. <i>Loves Bach <b>particularly</b> his partitas.</i>
<b>positively</b>	So as to be positive; in a positive manner. <i>This is <b>positively</b> the last word on the matter.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	In exact terms; without vagueness. <i>Kids will love it <b>precisely</b> because it will irritate their parents.</i>

<b>quite</b>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>We've had <b>quite</b> an afternoon.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I <b>really</b> want to go.</i>
<b>remarkably</b>	In a way that is worthy of attention. <i><b>Remarkably</b> she hung on to her job.</i>
<b>significantly</b>	In a sufficiently great or important way as to be worthy of attention. <i><b>Significantly</b> he has refused to give a straight answer to this question.</i>
<b>singularly</b>	In a strange or eccentric way. <i>A <b>singularly</b> unattractive colour.</i>
<b>so</b>	Similarly and also. <i>Help without which he would not have done <b>so</b> well.</i>
<b>supremely</b>	Very well; excellently. <i>They reigned <b>supremely</b>.</i>
<b>surely</b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>If there is no will then <b>surely</b> the house goes automatically to you.</i>
<b>thoroughly</b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<b>tremendously</b>	In an excellent or impressive way; extremely well. <i>I have been helped <b>tremendously</b> by my family.</i>
<b>truly</b>	Loyally or faithfully. <i>Management does not <b>truly</b> understand about the residents.</i>
<b>uncommonly</b>	Exceptionally; very. <i>He is an <b>uncommonly</b> good talker.</i>
<b>undeniably</b>	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>The results were <b>undeniably</b> impressive.</i>
<b>undoubtedly</b>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>They are <b>undoubtedly</b> guilty.</i>
<b>unquestionably</b>	In a way that cannot be disputed or doubted; without question. <i>The awards were <b>unquestionably</b> deserved.</i>
<b>unusually</b>	To a remarkable degree or extent. <i>There were an <b>unusually</b> large number of excellent performances.</i>
<b>very</b>	In a high degree. <i><b>Very</b> much so.</i>

- actually** In actual fact.  
*You may **actually** be doing the right thing by walking out.*
- assuredly** Confidently.  
*The lad kept his cool and **assuredly** slipped the ball between the posts.*

<b><u>authentic</u></b>	(of a church mode) containing notes between the final (the principal note) and the note an octave higher. <i>An <b>authentic</b> account by an eyewitness.</i>
<b><u>certainly</u></b>	Used to indicate that a statement is made as a concession or contrasted with another. <i>The prestigious address <b>certainly</b> adds to the firm's appeal.</i>
<b><u>certainty</u></b>	The state of being certain. <i>There is a bewildering lack of <b>certainty</b> and clarity in the law.</i>
<b>certitude</b>	Total certainty or greater certainty than circumstances warrant. <i>The collapse of the old political <b>certitudes</b> in eastern Europe.</i>
<b>cyberspace</b>	A computer network consisting of a worldwide network of computer networks that use the TCP/IP network protocols to facilitate data transmission and exchange. <i>I stayed in <b>cyberspace</b> for just a few minutes.</i>
<b><u>doubtless</u></b>	Presumably or very probably. <i><b>Doubtless</b> you'll solve the problem.</i>
<b>fact</b>	The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>A body of <b>fact</b>.</i>
<b>genuinely</b>	Genuinely with authority. <i>Both parties <b>genuinely</b> believe they're right.</i>
<b>indubitably</b>	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i><b>Indubitably</b> liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
<b>literally</b>	Used for emphasis while not being literally true. <i>I was <b>literally</b> blown away by the response I got.</i>
<b>obviously</b>	Unmistakably ('plain' is often used informally for 'plainly'). <i>The answer is <b>obviously</b> wrong.</i>
<b><u>practical</u></b>	Having or put to a practical purpose or use. <i>A <b>practical</b> stylish kitchen.</i>
<b><u>practically</u></b>	For all practical purposes but not completely. <i>The law isn't unreasonable or <b>practically</b> inconvenient.</i>
<b>real</b>	Really very. <i>He's my idea of a <b>real</b> man.</i>
<b><u>realism</u></b>	The doctrine that universals or abstract concepts have an objective or absolute existence. The theory that universals have their own reality is sometimes called Platonic realism because it was first outlined by Plato's doctrine of forms or ideas. <i>Political <b>realism</b> is the oldest approach to global politics.</i>



<b><u>realistic</u></b>	Representing things in a way that is accurate and true to life. <i><b>Realistic</b> portraiture.</i>
<b>reality</b>	Relating to reality TV. <i>We want to make the dream a <b>reality</b>.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not <b>really</b> my aunt and uncle.</i>
<b>sooth</b>	Truth or reality. <i>In <b>sooth</b>.</i>
<b><u>surely</u></b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>The results are <b>surely</b> encouraging.</i>
<b><u>truly</u></b>	In actual fact or without doubt; really. <i>A <b>truly</b> awful book.</i>
<b>truth</b>	Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>The fundamental <b>truths</b> about mankind.</i>
<b>verily</b>	In truth; certainly- Ps 37:3. <i><b>Verily</b> these men are mad.</i>
<b>verisimilitude</b>	The appearance of being true or real. <i>The detail gives the novel some <b>verisimilitude</b>.</i>
<b><u>virtual</u></b>	Carried out, accessed, or stored by means of a computer, especially over a network. <i>A <b>virtual</b> dependence on charity.</i>
