

Definitions of "Indeed" as an adverb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "indeed" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- Used to introduce a further and stronger or more surprising point.
- (used as an interjection) an expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc.
- Used to emphasize a statement or response confirming something already suggested.
- Used in a response to express interest, surprise, or contempt.
- An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection.
- *In truth (often tends to intensify.*
- Used to emphasize a description.
- Expressing interest of an ironic kind with repetition of a question just asked.






Usage Examples of "Indeed" as an adverb
