inflect	Of a word or language undergo inflection. <i>Her analysis may have been inflected by the upsurge of feminism.</i>
noun	A word other than a pronoun used to identify any of a class of people places or things common noun or to name a particular one of these proper noun.
paragraph	Write paragraphs work as a paragrapher. <i>This story is well paragraphed.</i>
participle	A word formed from a verb e g going gone being been and used as an adjective e g working woman burnt toast or a noun e g good breeding In English participles are also used to make compound verb forms e g is going has been.
phrase	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>The succession of downward phrases in the orchestra is so moving.</i>
<u>predicate</u>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>A word which predicates something about its subject.</i>
prefix	Attach a prefix to. <i>A preface is prefixed to the book.</i>
<u>proclaim</u>	Declare formally; declare someone to be something; of titles. <i>She proclaimed that what I had said was untrue.</i>

pronoun	A function word that is used in place of a noun or noun phrase.
redolent	Having a strong pleasant odor. <i>The hall was redolent of floor wax.</i>
revealing	The speech act of making something evident. <i>A revealing radio interview.</i>
