- revelatory** Revealing something hitherto unknown.  
*A **revelatory** experience.*
- significant** Being a symbol or sign of something; having a meaning.
- suggestive Tending to suggest an idea.  
*There were various **suggestive** pieces of evidence.*
- symbolic Involving the use of symbols or symbolism.  
***Symbolic** logic.*
- symptomatic** Serving as a symptom or sign, especially of something undesirable.  
*These difficulties are **symptomatic** of fundamental problems.*
- typical Of a feature that helps to distinguish a person or thing- Curtis Wilkie.  
*A **typical** romantic poem.*



## Usage Examples of "Indicative" as an adjective

<b>adverb</b>	A word or phrase that modifies or qualifies an adjective verb or other adverb or a word group expressing a relation of place time circumstance manner cause degree etc e g gently quite then there.
<b><u>affirm</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>He <b>affirmed</b> the country's commitment to peace.</i>

<b><u>conjunction</u></b>	The grammatical relation between linguistic units words or phrases or clauses that are connected by a conjunction. <i>The <b>conjunctions</b> and <b>oppositions</b> of the planets.</i>
<b>declarative</b>	Relating to the mood of verbs that is used simple in declarative statements. <i><b>Declarative</b> statements.</i>
<b>derivation</b>	(historical linguistics) an explanation of the historical origins of a word or phrase. <i>The <b>derivation</b> of scientific laws from observation.</i>
<b><u>derivative</u></b>	Resulting from or employing derivation. <i>Fly tip is a <b>derivative</b> of the phrase on the fly.</i>
<b>determiner</b>	A person or thing that determines or decides something.
<b><u>evocative</u></b>	Serving to bring to mind. <i>Powerfully <b>evocative</b> lyrics.</i>
<b>homograph</b>	Two words are homographs if they are spelled the same way but differ in meaning e g fair.
<b>infinitive</b>	The uninflected form of the verb. <i><b>Infinitive</b> clauses.</i>
<b>inflect</b>	Of a word or language undergo inflection. <i>Her analysis may have been <b>inflected</b> by the upsurge of feminism.</i>
<b>noun</b>	A word other than a pronoun used to identify any of a class of people places or things common noun or to name a particular one of these proper noun.
<b>paragraph</b>	Write paragraphs work as a paragrapher. <i>This story is well <b>paragraphed</b>.</i>
<b>participle</b>	A word formed from a verb e g going gone being been and used as an adjective e g working woman burnt toast or a noun e g good breeding In English participles are also used to make compound verb forms e g is going has been.
<b>phrase</b>	Divide combine or mark into phrases. <i>The succession of downward <b>phrases</b> in the orchestra is so moving.</i>
<b><u>predicate</u></b>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>A word which <b>predicates</b> something about its subject.</i>
<b>prefix</b>	Attach a prefix to. <i>A preface is <b>prefixed</b> to the book.</i>
<b><u>proclaim</u></b>	Declare formally; declare someone to be something; of titles. <i>She <b>proclaimed</b> that what I had said was untrue.</i>

<b>pronoun</b>	A function word that is used in place of a noun or noun phrase.
<b>redolent</b>	Having a strong pleasant odor. <i>The hall was <b>redolent</b> of floor wax.</i>
<b>revealing</b>	The speech act of making something evident. <i>A <b>revealing</b> radio interview.</i>
<b>suffix</b>	Attach a suffix to. <i><b>Suffix</b> words.</i>
<b><u>suggestive</u></b>	Indicative or evocative. <i><b>Suggestive</b> poses.</i>
