## Indict as a Verb

### Definitions of "Indict" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “indict” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Accuse formally of a crime.*
- *Formally accuse of or charge with a crime.*

### Synonyms of "Indict" as a verb (7 Words)

<b>accuse of</b>	Blame for, make a claim of wrongdoing or misbehavior against.
<b>arraign for</b>	Call before a court to answer an indictment.
<b>bring to trial for</b>	Attract the attention of.
<b>charge with</b>	Provide (a device) with something necessary.
<b>prosecute for</b>	Bring a criminal action against (in a trial).
<b>put on trial for</b>	Estimate.
<b>take to court for</b>	Ascertain or determine by measuring, computing or take a reading from a dial.

## Usage Examples of "Indict" as a verb

- *His former manager was indicted for fraud.*

## Associations of "Indict" (30 Words)

<b>accuse</b>	Claim that (someone) has done something wrong. <i>He was <b>accused</b> of murdering his wife s lover.</i>
<b><u>acquittal</u></b>	A judgement or verdict that a person is not guilty of the crime with which they have been charged. <i>The women felt their chances of <b>acquittal</b> were poor.</i>
<b><u>arraign</u></b>	Call or bring (someone) before a court to answer a criminal charge. <i>Social workers were relieved it was not they who were <b>arraigned</b> in the tabloids.</i>
<b>attorney</b>	A professional person authorized to practice law; conducts lawsuits or gives legal advice.
<b>blame</b>	Put or pin the blame on. <i>They are trying to put the <b>blame</b> on us.</i>
<b>castigation</b>	Verbal punishment.
<b>court</b>	The courtiers retinue and household of a sovereign. <i>She will take the matter to <b>court</b>.</i>
<b><u>crime</u></b>	An action or activity considered to be evil, shameful, or wrong. <i>It s a <b>crime</b> to keep a creature like Willy in a tank.</i>
<b>embezzle</b>	Appropriate (as property entrusted to one's care) fraudulently to one's own use. <i>She had <b>embezzled</b> 5 600 000 in company funds.</i>
<b>felony</b>	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>homicide</b>	The unlawful killing of one person by another. <i>Knives account for a third of all <b>homicides</b>.</i>
<b>impeach</b>	Challenge the honesty or veracity of. <i>The President was <b>impeached</b>.</i>
<b>instigator</b>	A person who initiates a course of action. <i>He was not the <b>instigator</b> of the incident.</i>
<b>juror</b>	Someone who serves (or waits to be called to serve) on a jury.
<b>jury</b>	Judge (an art or craft exhibition or exhibit). <i>The <b>jury</b> returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>

<b>lawyer</b>	Practise law work as a lawyer. <i>There is always a danger that the deal will be <b>lawyered</b> to death.</i>
<b>litigation</b>	A legal proceeding in a court; a judicial contest to determine and enforce legal rights. <i>The company wishes to avoid <b>litigation</b>.</i>
<b>malpractice</b>	A wrongful act that the actor had no right to do; improper professional conduct. <i>Investigations into <b>malpractices</b> and abuses of power.</i>
<b>misconduct</b>	Bad or dishonest management by persons supposed to act on another's behalf. <i>Smith got a game <b>misconduct</b> for spearing Nick Kypreos.</i>
<b>penalty</b>	The act of punishing. <i>Neglected his health and paid the <b>penalty</b>.</i>
<b>perfidy</b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>perjury</b>	The offence of wilfully telling an untruth or making a misrepresentation under oath. <i>He claimed two witnesses at his trial had committed <b>perjury</b>.</i>
<b>prosecutor</b>	A barrister or other lawyer who conducts the case against a defendant in a criminal court. <i>The <b>prosecutor</b> rose to give the opening address.</i>
<b>punish</b>	Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on. <i>I have done wrong and I m being <b>punished</b> for it.</i>
<b>regicide</b>	Someone who commits regicide the killer of a king.
<b>suicide</b>	A person who commits suicide. <i>Drug related <b>suicides</b>.</i>
<b>suspicion</b>	A very slight trace. <i>Police would not say what aroused their <b>suspicions</b>.</i>
<b>treason</b>	The crime of betraying one's country, especially by attempting to kill or overthrow the sovereign or government. <i>They were convicted of <b>treason</b>.</i>
<b>trial</b>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>The <b>trials</b> for the semifinals began yesterday.</i>
<b>violator</b>	A person who treats something with irreverence or disrespect. <i>Monica is able to name the <b>violators</b> of her body.</i>
