## Synonyms of "Indignant" as an adjective (23 Words)

<b><u>aggrieved</u></b>	Feeling resentment at having been unfairly treated. <i>They were <b>aggrieved</b> at the outcome.</i>
<b>angry</b>	Feeling or showing anger. <i>He looked <b>angry</b> and confused.</i>
<b>annoyed</b>	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>I got very <b>annoyed</b> watching the film.</i>
<b>chagrined</b>	Feeling or caused to feel ill at ease or self-conscious or ashamed. <i><b>Chagrined</b> at the poor sales of his book.</i>
<b>discontented</b>	Showing or experiencing dissatisfaction or restless longing. <i>Was <b>discontented</b> with his position.</i>
<b><u>disgruntled</u></b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<b><u>dissatisfied</u></b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>His parents are <b>dissatisfied</b> with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
<b>distressed</b>	Generalized feeling of distress. <i>A <b>distressed</b> leather jacket.</i>
<b>disturbed</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i><b>Disturbed</b> grass showed where the horse had passed.</i>

<b>hurt</b>	Suffering from physical injury especially that suffered in battle. <i>Ambulances for the <b>hurt</b> men and women.</i>
<b>in high dudgeon</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>incensed</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>Leonora glared back at him <b>incensed</b>.</i>
<b>irritated</b>	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i>The <b>irritated</b> look on Alec s face.</i>
<b>nettled</b>	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i>Feeling <b>nettled</b> from the constant teasing.</i>
<b>offended</b>	Resentful or annoyed, typically as a result of a perceived insult. <i>He sounded rather <b>offended</b>.</i>
<b><u>outraged</u></b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>A look of <b>outraged</b> disbelief.</i>
<b><u>pained</u></b>	Affected with pain, especially mental pain; hurt or troubled. <i>A <b>pained</b> expression came over his face.</i>
<b><u>resentful</u></b>	Feeling or expressing bitterness or indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i>He was angry and <b>resentful</b> of their intrusion.</i>
<b>riled</b>	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i><b>Riled</b> no end by his lies.</i>
<b>umbrageous</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i><b>Umbrageous</b> at the loss of their territory.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Causing discomfort. <i>After the argument they lapsed into an <b>unhappy</b> silence.</i>
<b>upset</b>	Having been turned so that the bottom is no longer the bottom. <i>An <b>upset</b> stomach.</i>
<b><u>vexed</u></b>	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>The <b>vexed</b> question of how much money the government is going to spend.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Indignant" as an adjective

## Associations of "Indignant" (30 Words)

<b>acrimonious</b>	Marked by strong resentment or cynicism. <i>An <b>acrimonious</b> dispute.</i>
<b>afire</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>The whole mill was <b>afire</b>.</i>
<b>angry</b>	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. <i>An <b>angry</b> sore.</i>
<b>choleric</b>	Easily moved to anger- H.G.Wells. <i>He was a <b>choleric</b> self important little man.</i>
<b>enraged</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i>An <b>enraged</b> mob screamed abuse.</i>
<b>exasperated</b>	Greatly annoyed; out of patience. <i>Felt <b>exasperated</b> beyond endurance.</i>
<b>frown</b>	A facial expression of dislike or displeasure. <i>Promiscuity was <b>frowned</b> upon.</i>
<b>fume</b>	Expose something especially wood to ammonia fumes in order to produce dark tints. <i>Clouds of exhaust <b>fumes</b> spewed by cars.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>He drove at a <b>furious</b> speed.</i>
<b>furiously</b>	In an impassioned or very angry manner. <i>Charlie pedalled <b>furiously</b> for six miles.</i>
<b>fury</b>	A spirit of punishment, often represented as one of three goddesses who pronounced curses on the guilty and inflicted famines and pestilences. The Furies were identified at an early date with the Eumenides. <i>She was paddling with a new <b>fury</b>.</i>
<b>huff</b>	Sniff fumes from (petrol or solvents) for a euphoric effect. <i>It is important to educate young people about the dangers of <b>huffing</b> inhalants.</i>
<b>inflammatory</b>	Relating to or causing inflammation of a part of the body. <i>An <b>inflammatory</b> response.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<b>irascible</b>	Characterized by anger. <i>An <b>irascible</b> response.</i>

<b>irate</b>	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i>A barrage of <b>irate</b> letters.</i>
<b>miff</b>	Cause to be annoyed. <i>I ll confess it <b>miffed</b> me slightly at the time.</i>
<b>nauseate</b>	Upset and make nauseated. <i>They were <b>nauseated</b> by the jingoism.</i>
<b><u>outraged</u></b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>A look of <b>outraged</b> disbelief.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Continue with great force or intensity. <i>That s unfair Maggie <b>raged</b>.</i>
<b>rancor</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
<b>rancorous</b>	Characterized by bitterness or resentment. <i>A <b>rancorous</b> debate.</i>
<b><u>resentful</u></b>	Feeling or expressing bitterness or indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i>A sullen <b>resentful</b> attitude.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>Some people harbour <b>resentments</b> going back many years.</i>
<b>revengeful</b>	Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare- M.R.Cohen. <i>The average Briton is not naturally vindictive and <b>revengeful</b>.</i>
<b><u>scowl</u></b>	Frown with displeasure. <i>She <b>scowled</b> at him defiantly.</i>
<b><u>sigh</u></b>	A sound like a person sighing. <i>Harry sank into a chair and <b>sighed</b> with relief.</i>
<b><u>snarl</u></b>	Make a snarling noise or move with a snarling noise. <i>The guard <b>snarled</b> at us.</i>
<b>sulk</b>	A period of sulking. <i>He was <b>sulking</b> over the break up of his band.</i>
<b><u>wrath</u></b>	Intense anger (usually on an epic scale). <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father s <b>wrath</b>.</i>
