- *In a random manner; unsystematically.*

Synonyms of "Indiscriminately" as an adverb (9 Words)

aimlessly	Without aim; in an aimless manner. <i>We wandered aimlessly round Venice.</i>
arbitrarily	On the basis of random choice or personal whim, rather than any reason or system. <i>Recurrent infection is arbitrarily defined as three or more infections a year.</i>
blindly	Without being able to see; unseeingly. <i>Don t blindly accept dogma as justification.</i>

haphazardly	In a random manner. <i>A hodgepodge of family photos haphazardly arranged on a table.</i>
promiscuously	In a licentious and promiscuous manner. <i>This young girl has to share a room with her mother who lives promiscuously.</i>
randomly	In a random manner. <i>The houses were randomly scattered.</i>
uncritically	With a lack of criticism or consideration of whether something is right or wrong. <i>He uncritically accepts lunatic ideas and believes almost anything.</i>
unsystematically	In an unsystematic manner.
willy-nilly	In a random manner.

Usage Examples of "Indiscriminately" as an adverb

- *His armies slaughtered men, women, and children indiscriminately.*
- *People who are sedentary and who eat indiscriminately.*

Associations of "Indiscriminately" (30 Words)

<u>adjustable</u>	Able to be adjusted. <i>The car has fully adjustable seats and steering wheel.</i>
arbitrarily	In a random manner. <i>Recurrent infection is arbitrarily defined as three or more infections a year.</i>
<u>arbitrary</u>	(of a constant or other quantity) of unspecified value. <i>The arbitrary rule of a dictator.</i>
arrhythmic	Without regard for rhythm. <i>The arrhythmic phrasing of the music.</i>
assigned	Appointed to a post or duty. <i>Assigned duties.</i>
authority	(usually plural) persons who exercise (administrative) control over others. <i>Military forces have the legal authority to arrest drug traffickers.</i>
changeable	Subject to change. <i>Cover the tables with changeable cloths.</i>

discretionary	Denoting or relating to investment funds placed with a broker or manager who has discretion to invest them on the client's behalf. Discretionary funds.
dominate	Be the most important or conspicuous person or thing in. <i>A picturesque city dominated by the cathedral tower.</i>
extrajudicial	(of a sentence) not legally authorized. <i>An extrajudicial penalty.</i>
<u>haphazard</u>	Lacking any obvious principle of organization. <i>A haphazard plan of action.</i>
haphazardly	In a random manner. <i>A hodgepodge of family photos haphazardly arranged on a table.</i>
impetuosity	Rash impulsiveness.
<u>impetuous</u>	Marked by violent force. Impetuous heaving waves.
indiscriminate	(of a person) not using or exercising discrimination. <i>An indiscriminate mixture of colors and styles.</i>
luck	Success or failure apparently brought by chance rather than through one's own actions. <i>It was my good luck to be there.</i>
option	Buy or sell an option on. <i>His second script will have been optioned by the time you read this.</i>
perfunctorily	In a set manner without serious attention; as a formality. <i>He kissed her cheek perfunctorily.</i>
random	An unknown, unspecified, or odd person. <i>Some randoms in the crowd asked Ivan Ljubicic to take a photo for them.</i>
randomize	Make (a set of items, people, etc.) unpredictable, unsystematic, or random in order or arrangement. <i>You can randomize the ingredients with the tap of a button.</i>
randomly	In a random manner. <i>I randomly split the ironing into two piles.</i>
<u>sample</u>	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>The input signal must be sampled at twice its highest frequency.</i>
sampling	A sample. <i>The list provides a sampling of the many resources available.</i>
selection	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>The publication of a selection of his poems.</i>

<u>shuffle</u>	A piece of music for or in the style of a shuffle. He shuffled his funds among different accounts in various countries so as to avoid the IRS.
slapdash	Directly. The shelves were put up slapdash .
slipshod	(of shoes) worn down at the heel. Slipshod spelling.
<u>unjustified</u>	Not shown to be right or reasonable. Unjustified price increases.
<u>unpredictable</u>	Not capable of being foretold. The unpredictable weather of the Scottish islands.
<u>whimsical</u>	Acting or behaving in a capricious manner. The victim of whimsical persecutions.
