burning	Very keenly or deeply felt; intense. <i>Pension reform is still a burning issue.</i>

<u>compelling</u>	Not able to be resisted; overwhelming. <i>The temptation to give up was compelling.</i>
<u>compulsory</u>	Required by rule. <i>It was compulsory to attend mass.</i>
<u>consequential</u>	Important; significant. <i>Consequential damages.</i>
critical	Of or involving or characteristic of critics or criticism. <i>The floodwaters had not receded and the situation was still critical.</i>
crucial	Having crucial relevance. <i>A crucial issue for women.</i>

<u>imperative</u>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Requests that grew more and more imperative.</i>
important	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Recited the decree with an important air.</i>
key	Of crucial importance. <i>She became a key figure in the suffragette movement.</i>
mandatory	Required by law or mandate; compulsory. <i>Wearing helmets was made mandatory for pedal cyclists.</i>
necessary	Absolutely essential. <i>They granted the necessary planning permission.</i>
<u>needed</u>	Necessary for relief or supply.
obligatory	So customary or fashionable as to be expected of everyone or on every occasion. <i>A sovereign whose laws are obligatory.</i>
of great consequence	Remarkable or out of the ordinary in degree or magnitude or effect.
of the utmost importance	Most remote in space or time or order.
<u>paramount</u>	More important than anything else; supreme. <i>A paramount chief.</i>
pressing	Expressing something strongly or persistently. <i>A pressing invitation.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>Required reading.</i>

requisite	Necessary for relief or supply. <i>The application will not be processed until the requisite fee is paid.</i>
significant	Sufficiently great or important to be worthy of attention; noteworthy. <i>No significant difference was found.</i>
urgent	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>The urgent words Hurry Hurry.</i>
vital	Absolutely necessary; essential. <i>Of vital interest.</i>
vitaly important	Full of spirit.

necessarily	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <i>It is necessarily so.</i>
necessary	The basic requirements of life, such as food and warmth. <i>The necessary consequences of one's actions.</i>
necessity	A condition that cannot be otherwise, or a statement asserting this. <i>The necessity of growing old.</i>
need	Have need of. <i>A general state of need exists among the homeless.</i>
needs	Of necessity. <i>We must needs by objective.</i>
perforce	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
prerequisite	Something that is required in advance. <i>Sponsorship is not a prerequisite for any of our courses.</i>
primary	Of primary importance. <i>Primary sources.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the required female shape.</i>

requisite	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. <i>The application will not be processed until the requisite fee is paid.</i>
<u>staple</u>	Secure or fasten with a staple or staples. <i>Wheat is a staple crop.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Strongly built or made. <i>Won by a substantial margin.</i>
<u>substantive</u>	Having a firm basis in reality and so important, meaningful, or considerable. <i>There is no substantive evidence for the efficacy of these drugs.</i>
<u>unavoidable</u>	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>The natural and unavoidable consequences of growing old.</i>
<u>underlying</u>	Being or involving basic facts or principles. <i>An underlying meaning.</i>
<u>vital</u>	Full of spirit. <i>A vital and charismatic leader.</i>
