
## Individualistic as an Adjective

- More interested in individual people than in society as a whole.






# Synonyms of "Individualistic" as an adjective (17 Words)

<u>atypical</u>	Not representative of a group, class, or type. A class of <b>atypical</b> mosses.
<u>groundbreaking</u>	Being or producing something like nothing done or experienced or created before. <i>Groundbreaking</i> research into fertility problems.
independent	Not depending on something else for strength or effectiveness; free- standing. <i>A series of <b>independent</b> judgments.</i>
individualist	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>Individualist attitudes</i> .
laissez-faire	With minimally restricted freedom in commerce.
liberated	(of a place or people) freed from enemy occupation. A <b>liberated</b> lifestyle.



nonconformist	Not conforming to established customs or doctrines especially in religion. Their rabidly <b>nonconformist</b> deportment has made them legendary.
<u>original</u>	(of e.g. information) not secondhand or by way of something intermediary. <i>He kept the <b>original</b> copy and gave her only a xerox.</i>
<u>pioneering</u>	Involving new ideas or methods. His <b>pioneering</b> work on consciousness.
<u>singular</u>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. Can the <b>singular</b> person be understood apart from his culture.
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. An <b>uncommon</b> amount of noise.
unconstrained	Free from constraint. Idle <b>unconstrained</b> gossip.
unconventional	Not conforming to accepted rules or standards. <i>His <b>unconventional</b> approach to life.</i>
unfettered	Not bound by shackles and chains. <b>Unfettered</b> artistic genius.
unique	Radically distinctive and without equal. Bach was <b>unique</b> in his handling of counterpoint.
unorthodox	Independent in behavior or thought. An <b>unorthodox</b> lifestyle.
untrammelled	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. A mind <b>untrammelled</b> by convention.

clannish	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>Clannish loyalty.</i>
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall <b>conceit</b>.</i>
covotouenose	An anytique aggarnase to passage comothing

covetousness An envious eagerness to possess something.



<u>ego</u>	An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others. <i>He needed a boost to his <b>ego</b>.</i>
<u>egocentric</u>	An egocentric person. <b>Egocentric</b> loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.
egocentrism	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
egoism	An ethical theory that treats self-interest as the foundation of morality.
egoist	A self-centered person with little regard for others.
egotism	The fact of being excessively conceited or absorbed in oneself. In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.
egotist	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self- seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed <b>egotist</b>.</i>
<u>emptiness</u>	The state of containing nothing. The <b>emptiness</b> of outer space.
greed	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Greed</i> has taken over football.
haughtiness	The appearance or quality of being arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Her air of <b>haughtiness</b></i> .
hedonism	The pursuit of pleasure as a matter of ethical principle.
<u>hubris</u>	Excessive pride or self-confidence. The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.
independent	An independent person or body. Advice for <b>independent</b> travellers.
individual	A single human being as distinct from a group. She creates her own highly <b>individual</b> landscapes.
individualism	The quality of being individual. A culture that celebrates <b>individualism</b> and wealth.
individualist	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>A rugged <b>individualist</b> driven to succeed.</i>
maverick	An unbranded range animal (especially a stray calf); belongs to the first person who puts a brand on it. <i>He s the <b>maverick</b> of the senate.</i>
narcissism	An exceptional interest in and admiration for yourself.
<u>pride</u>	The quality of having an excessively high opinion of oneself or one's importance. The males in the <b>pride</b> are very tolerant towards all the cubs.



<u>self</u>	Relating to of or by or to or from or for the self. A button through style with <b>self</b> belt.
selfish	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
selfishness	The quality or state of being selfish; lack of consideration for other people. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b>.</i>
<u>single</u>	Reduce a railway track to a single line. The divorce rate is rising so you ll see more <b>single</b> s in their late 30s and early 40s.
superego	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>The father is the model for the superego</i> .
unique	A unique person or thing. A species <b>unique</b> to Australia.
<u>vanity</u>	The quality of being valueless or futile. The <b>vanity</b> of human wishes.
