Not depending on something else for strength or effectiveness; free-standing.

*A series of **independent** judgments.*

### **individualist**

Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control.

***Individualist** attitudes.*

### **laissez-faire**

With minimally restricted freedom in commerce.

### **liberated**

(of a place or people) freed from enemy occupation.

*A **liberated** lifestyle.*

<b>nonconformist</b>	Not conforming to established customs or doctrines especially in religion. <i>Their rabidly <b>nonconformist</b> deportment has made them legendary.</i>
<b>original</b>	(of e.g. information) not secondhand or by way of something intermediary. <i>He kept the <b>original</b> copy and gave her only a xerox.</i>
<b>pioneering</b>	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>His <b>pioneering</b> work on consciousness.</i>
<b>singular</b>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>Can the <b>singular</b> person be understood apart from his culture.</i>
<b>uncommon</b>	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>An <b>uncommon</b> amount of noise.</i>
<b>unconstrained</b>	Free from constraint. <i>Idle <b>unconstrained</b> gossip.</i>
<b>unconventional</b>	Not conforming to accepted rules or standards. <i>His <b>unconventional</b> approach to life.</i>
<b>unfettered</b>	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i><b>Unfettered</b> artistic genius.</i>
<b>unique</b>	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>Bach was <b>unique</b> in his handling of counterpoint.</i>
<b>unorthodox</b>	Independent in behavior or thought. <i>An <b>unorthodox</b> lifestyle.</i>
<b>untrammelled</b>	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. <i>A mind <b>untrammelled</b> by convention.</i>

<b>centered</b>	Being or placed in the center.
<b>clannish</b>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <b>Clannish</b> loyalty.
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b>covetousness</b>	An envious eagerness to possess something.

<b>ego</b>	An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others. <i>He needed a boost to his <b>ego</b>.</i>
<b>egocentric</b>	An egocentric person. <i><b>Egocentric</b> loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.</i>
<b>egocentrism</b>	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
<b>egoism</b>	An ethical theory that treats self-interest as the foundation of morality.
<b>egoist</b>	A self-centered person with little regard for others.
<b>egotism</b>	The fact of being excessively conceited or absorbed in oneself. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>egotist</b>	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self-seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed <b>egotist</b>.</i>
<b>emptiness</b>	The state of containing nothing. <i>The <b>emptiness</b> of outer space.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i><b>Greed</b> has taken over football.</i>
<b>haughtiness</b>	The appearance or quality of being arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Her air of <b>haughtiness</b>.</i>
<b>hedonism</b>	The pursuit of pleasure as a matter of ethical principle.
<b>hubris</b>	Excessive pride or self-confidence. <i>The self assured <b>hubris</b> among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.</i>
<b>independent</b>	An independent person or body. <i>Advice for <b>independent</b> travellers.</i>
<b>individual</b>	A single human being as distinct from a group. <i>She creates her own highly <b>individual</b> landscapes.</i>
<b>individualism</b>	The quality of being individual. <i>A culture that celebrates <b>individualism</b> and wealth.</i>
<b>individualist</b>	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>A rugged <b>individualist</b> driven to succeed.</i>
<b>maverick</b>	An unbranded range animal (especially a stray calf); belongs to the first person who puts a brand on it. <i>He s the <b>maverick</b> of the senate.</i>
<b>narcissism</b>	An exceptional interest in and admiration for yourself.
<b>pride</b>	The quality of having an excessively high opinion of oneself or one's importance. <i>The males in the <b>pride</b> are very tolerant towards all the cubs.</i>

<b><u>self</u></b>	Relating to of or by or to or from or for the self. <i>A button through style with <b>self</b> belt.</i>
<b>selfish</b>	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
<b>selfishness</b>	The quality or state of being selfish; lack of consideration for other people. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b>.</i>
<b><u>single</u></b>	Reduce a railway track to a single line. <i>The divorce rate is rising so you ll see more <b>singles</b> in their late 30s and early 40s.</i>
<b>superego</b>	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>The father is the model for the <b>superego</b>.</i>
<b>unique</b>	A unique person or thing. <i>A species <b>unique</b> to Australia.</i>
<b><u>vanity</u></b>	The quality of being valueless or futile. <i>The <b>vanity</b> of human wishes.</i>
