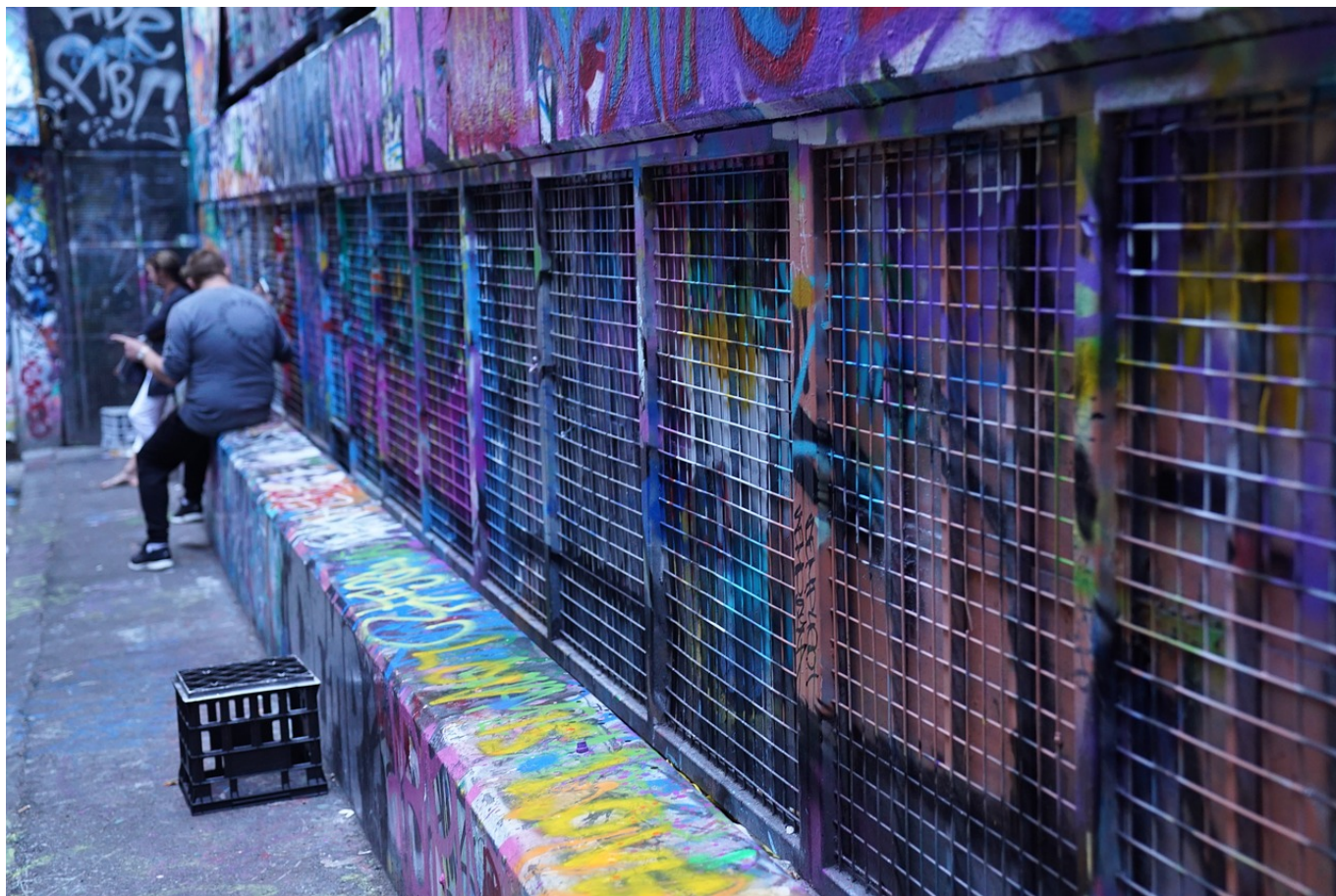
- *Marked by or expressing individuality.*

atypical	Not representative of a group, class, or type. <i>A class of atypical mosses.</i>
groundbreaking	Being or producing something like nothing done or experienced or created before. <i>Groundbreaking research into fertility problems.</i>
independent	Not depending on something else for strength or effectiveness; free-standing. <i>A series of independent judgments.</i>
individualist	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>Individualist attitudes.</i>
laissez-faire	With minimally restricted freedom in commerce.
liberated	(of a place or people) freed from enemy occupation. <i>A liberated lifestyle.</i>

nonconformist	Not conforming to established customs or doctrines especially in religion. <i>Their rabidly nonconformist deportment has made them legendary.</i>
<u>original</u>	(of e.g. information) not secondhand or by way of something intermediary. <i>He kept the original copy and gave her only a xerox.</i>
<u>pioneering</u>	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>His pioneering work on consciousness.</i>
<u>singular</u>	Relating to or of the nature of singularity. <i>Can the singular person be understood apart from his culture.</i>
uncommon	Marked by an uncommon quality especially superlative or extreme of its kind. <i>An uncommon amount of noise.</i>
unconstrained	Free from constraint. <i>Idle unconstrained gossip.</i>
unconventional	Not conforming to accepted rules or standards. <i>His unconventional approach to life.</i>
unfettered	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
unique	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>Bach was unique in his handling of counterpoint.</i>
unorthodox	Independent in behavior or thought. <i>An unorthodox lifestyle.</i>
untrammelled	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. <i>A mind untrammelled by convention.</i>

clannish	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. Clannish loyalty.
conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall conceit.</i>
covetousness	An envious eagerness to possess something.

ego	An inflated feeling of pride in your superiority to others. <i>He needed a boost to his ego.</i>
egocentric	An egocentric person. <i>Egocentric loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.</i>
egocentrism	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
egoism	An ethical theory that treats self-interest as the foundation of morality.
egoist	A self-centered person with little regard for others.
egotism	The fact of being excessively conceited or absorbed in oneself. <i>In his arrogance and egotism he underestimated Gill.</i>
egotist	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self-seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed egotist.</i>
emptiness	The state of containing nothing. <i>The emptiness of outer space.</i>
greed	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>Greed has taken over football.</i>
haughtiness	The appearance or quality of being arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Her air of haughtiness.</i>
hedonism	The pursuit of pleasure as a matter of ethical principle.
hubris	Excessive pride or self-confidence. <i>The self assured hubris among economists was shaken in the late 1980s.</i>
independent	An independent person or body. <i>Advice for independent travellers.</i>
individual	A single human being as distinct from a group. <i>She creates her own highly individual landscapes.</i>
individualism	The quality of being individual. <i>A culture that celebrates individualism and wealth.</i>
individualist	Relating to or denoting a social theory favouring freedom of action for individuals over collective or state control. <i>A rugged individualist driven to succeed.</i>
maverick	An unbranded range animal (especially a stray calf); belongs to the first person who puts a brand on it. <i>He s the maverick of the senate.</i>
narcissism	An exceptional interest in and admiration for yourself.
pride	The quality of having an excessively high opinion of oneself or one's importance. <i>The males in the pride are very tolerant towards all the cubs.</i>

<u>self</u>	Relating to of or by or to or from or for the self. <i>A button through style with self belt.</i>
selfish	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others. <i>I joined them for selfish reasons.</i>
selfishness	The quality or state of being selfish; lack of consideration for other people. <i>An act of pure selfishness.</i>
<u>single</u>	Reduce a railway track to a single line. <i>The divorce rate is rising so you ll see more singles in their late 30s and early 40s.</i>
superego	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>The father is the model for the superego.</i>
unique	A unique person or thing. <i>A species unique to Australia.</i>
<u>vanity</u>	The quality of being valueless or futile. <i>The vanity of human wishes.</i>
