According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “individuality” as a noun can have the following definitions:

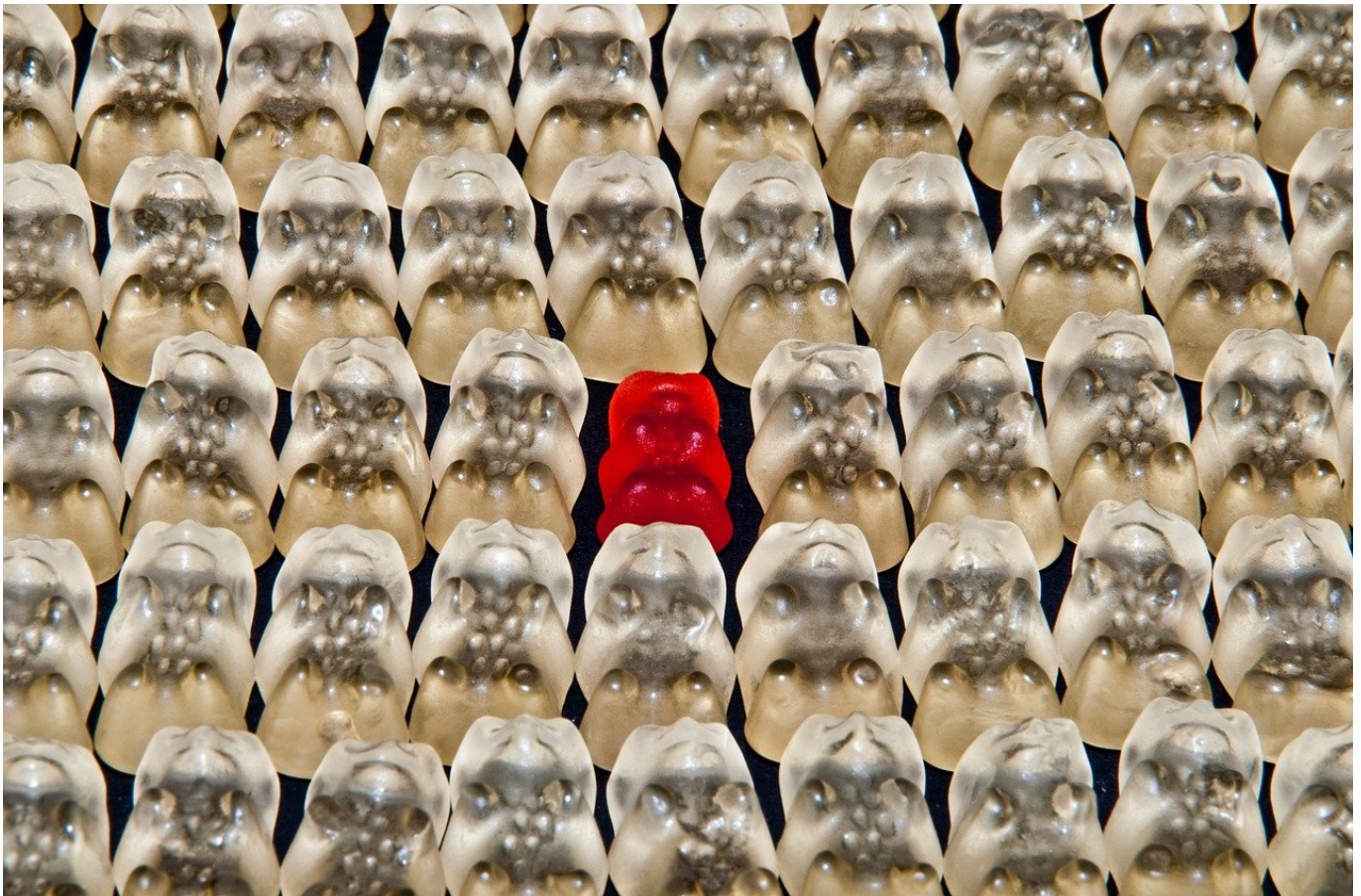
- *Individual characteristics.*

Synonyms of "Individuality" as a noun (12 Words)

<u>distinction</u>	An honor awarded to someone in recognition of achievement or superiority. <i>He learned the distinction between gold and lead.</i>
distinctiveness	Utter dissimilarity. <i>Communities are keen to maintain cultural distinctiveness.</i>
identity	The characteristics determining who or what a person or thing is. <i>They shared an identity of interests.</i>
individualism	Self-centred feeling or conduct; egoism. <i>Encouragement has been given to individualism free enterprise and the pursuit of profit.</i>
individuation	The quality of being individual.
<u>originality</u>	The ability to think and act independently. <i>She s a writer of great originality.</i>

particularity	Fullness or minuteness of detail in the treatment of something. <i>The central figures of his novels are stripped of their particularity.</i>
peculiarity	An odd or unusual characteristic. <i>His essays characterized decency as a British peculiarity.</i>
personal identity	A short newspaper article about a particular person or group.
separateness	Political independence. <i>Seeking complete political separateness for Taiwan.</i>
singularity	A hypothetical moment in time when artificial intelligence and other technologies have become so advanced that humanity undergoes a dramatic and irreversible change. <i>Maybe the singularity just happened and we didn't notice.</i>
uniqueness	The quality of being particularly remarkable, special, or unusual. <i>Genetic uniqueness.</i>

individualism	The habit or principle of being independent and self-reliant. <i>Encouragement has been given to individualism free enterprise and the pursuit of profit.</i>
individualist	Relating to or characterized by the habit or principle of being independent and self-reliant. <i>Individualist capitalism.</i>
individualistic	With minimally restricted freedom in commerce. <i>Individualistic cultures where individuals strive for self realization.</i>
individuation	Discriminating the individual from the generic group or species.
indivisible	Unable to be divided or separated. <i>An indivisible union of states.</i>
lone	Characterized by or preferring solitude. <i>A lone fisherman stood on a tuft of gravel.</i>
lonely	(of a place) unfrequented and remote. <i>A lonely crossroads.</i>
once	As soon as. <i>Once two is two.</i>
only	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>It s simply the only place to be seen these days.</i>
particular	A detail. <i>He always reasons from the particular to the general.</i>
personal	Of or arising from personality. <i>I have something personal to tell you.</i>
purely	Restricted to something. <i>Act nobly speak purely and think charitably.</i>
respectively	In the order given. <i>They received sentences of one year and eight months respectively.</i>
seclude	Keep (someone) away from other people. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
secluded	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>

<u>single</u>	A single measure of spirits. <i>The individual blooms can be single semi double or fully double.</i>
<u>singular</u>	The singular number. <i>A singular example.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>Sole rights of publication.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>He is solely responsible for any debts the company may incur.</i>
<u>solitary</u>	Lacking companions or companionship. <i>I live a pretty solitary life.</i>
unique	A unique person or thing. <i>A unique opportunity to see the spectacular Bolshoi Ballet.</i>
uniquely	In a very special or unusual way. <i>Uniquely shaped buildings.</i>
unshared	Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer unshared independent accommodation.</i>
