Definitions of "Induce" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “induce” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause to arise.*
- *Reason or establish by induction.*
- *Produce electric current by electrostatic or magnetic processes.*
- *Initiate or enhance (a biochemical process, especially the synthesis of an enzyme).*
- *Bring on (the birth of a baby) artificially, typically by the use of drugs.*
- *Cause (radioactivity) by bombardment with radiation.*
- *Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.*
- *Succeed in persuading or leading (someone) to do something.*
- *Bring about or give rise to.*
- *Derive by inductive reasoning.*
- *Bring on childbirth in (a pregnant woman) artificially, typically by the use of drugs.*

- Cause to occur rapidly.
- Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction.

exert influence on	Have and exercise.
<u>foster</u>	Bring up under fosterage of children. <i>Appropriate praise helps a child foster a sense of self worth.</i>
generate	Bring into existence. <i>The computer generated this image.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>What did you get at the toy store.</i>
give rise to	Consent to engage in sexual intercourse with a man.
hasten	Act or move at high speed. <i>This tragedy probably hastened his own death from heart disease.</i>
have	Have sex with archaic use. <i>Have a postdoc.</i>
have as a consequence	Have ownership or possession of.
have as a result	Be confronted with.
impel	Urge or force (a person) to an action; constrain or motivate. <i>A lack of equality impelled the oppressed to fight.</i>
<u>incite</u>	Urge or persuade (someone) to act in a violent or unlawful way. <i>He incited loyal subjects to rebellion.</i>
induct	Admit (someone) formally to a post or organization. <i>We were inducted into the honor society.</i>

influence	Shape or influence give direction to. <i>The artist s work influenced the young painter.</i>
inspire	Breathe in (air); inhale. <i>His philosophy inspired a later generation of environmentalists.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Bring about or initiate (an action or event). <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>kindle</u>	Catch fire. <i>The young man kindled at once.</i>
lead to	Be in charge of.
make	Make by shaping or bringing together constituents. <i>He will make a splendid father.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>He said he would motivate funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
move	Cause to move or shift into a new position or place both in a concrete and in an abstract sense. <i>This moved me to sacrifice my career.</i>
occasion	Give occasion to. <i>His death occasioned her much grief.</i>
<u>originate</u>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>A new religious movement originated in that country.</i>
persuade	Cause (someone) to believe something, especially after a sustained effort; convince. <i>He did everything he could to persuade the police that he was the robber.</i>
press	Exert pressure or force to or upon. <i>This guy can press 300 pounds.</i>
prevail upon	Be valid, applicable, or true.
produce	Bring onto the market or release. <i>The tree would not produce fruit.</i>
promote	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>Some regulation is still required to promote competition.</i>
prompt	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>And the picture he prompted.</i>
result in	Issue or terminate (in a specified way, state, etc.); end.
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She d just stay a few more minutes then rouse herself and go back.</i>

rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>As soon as the campaign started they rushed into action.</i>
set in motion	Set in type.
spark off	Emit or produce sparks.
stimulate	Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process). <i>This herbal infusion doesn't stimulate.</i>
stir up	Affect emotionally.
trigger off	Release or pull the trigger on.
urge	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>Drawing up outside the house he urged her inside.</i>
whip up	Beat severely with a whip or rod.

catalyze	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
coax	Gently and persistently persuade (someone) to do something. <i>He was coaxing me to walk a bit further.</i>

<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Gould was excited by these discoveries.</i>
<u>exhort</u>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>I exhorted her to be a good child.</i>
impel	Drive, force, or urge (someone) to do something. <i>Vital energies impel him in unforeseen directions.</i>
<u>incite</u>	Encourage or stir up (violent or unlawful behaviour). <i>They conspired to incite riots.</i>
incitement	An act of urging on or spurring on or rousing to action or instigating. <i>This amounted to an incitement to commit murder.</i>
inspire	Draw in (air). <i>His passion for literature inspired him to begin writing.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Provoke or stir up. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>invigorate</u>	Give strength or energy to. <i>The cold water invigorated him.</i>

stimulate	Stir feelings in. <i>Coffee and tea stimulate me.</i>
