### Definitions of "Induce" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “induce” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause to arise.*
- *Reason or establish by induction.*
- *Produce electric current by electrostatic or magnetic processes.*
- *Initiate or enhance (a biochemical process, especially the synthesis of an enzyme).*
- *Bring on (the birth of a baby) artificially, typically by the use of drugs.*
- *Cause (radioactivity) by bombardment with radiation.*
- *Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.*
- *Succeed in persuading or leading (someone) to do something.*
- *Bring about or give rise to.*
- *Derive by inductive reasoning.*
- *Bring on childbirth in (a pregnant woman) artificially, typically by the use of drugs.*

- Cause to occur rapidly.
- Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction.

<b>encourage</b>	Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief). <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b>engender</b>	Cause or give rise to (a feeling, situation, or condition). <i>The issue <b>engendered</b> continuing controversy.</i>
<b>exert influence on</b>	Have and exercise.
<b><u>foster</u></b>	Bring up under fosterage of children. <i>Appropriate praise helps a child <b>foster</b> a sense of self worth.</i>
<b>generate</b>	Bring into existence. <i>The computer <b>generated</b> this image.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>What did you <b>get</b> at the toy store.</i>
<b>give rise to</b>	Consent to engage in sexual intercourse with a man.
<b>hasten</b>	Act or move at high speed. <i>This tragedy probably <b>hastened</b> his own death from heart disease.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have sex with archaic use. <i><b>Have</b> a postdoc.</i>
<b>have as a consequence</b>	Have ownership or possession of.
<b>have as a result</b>	Be confronted with.
<b>impel</b>	Urge or force (a person) to an action; constrain or motivate. <i>A lack of equality <b>impelled</b> the oppressed to fight.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Urge or persuade (someone) to act in a violent or unlawful way. <i>He <b>incited</b> loyal subjects to rebellion.</i>
<b>induct</b>	Admit (someone) formally to a post or organization. <i>We were <b>inducted</b> into the honor society.</i>

<b>influence</b>	Shape or influence give direction to. <i>The artist s work <b>influenced</b> the young painter.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Breathe in (air); inhale. <i>His philosophy <b>inspired</b> a later generation of environmentalists.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Bring about or initiate (an action or event). <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>kindle</u></b>	Catch fire. <i>The young man <b>kindled</b> at once.</i>
<b>lead to</b>	Be in charge of.
<b>make</b>	Make by shaping or bringing together constituents. <i>He will <b>make</b> a splendid father.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>He said he would <b>motivate</b> funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
<b>move</b>	Cause to move or shift into a new position or place both in a concrete and in an abstract sense. <i>This <b>moved</b> me to sacrifice my career.</i>
<b>occasion</b>	Give occasion to. <i>His death <b>occasioned</b> her much grief.</i>
<b><u>originate</u></b>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>A new religious movement <b>originated</b> in that country.</i>
<b>persuade</b>	Cause (someone) to believe something, especially after a sustained effort; convince. <i>He did everything he could to <b>persuade</b> the police that he was the robber.</i>
<b>press</b>	Exert pressure or force to or upon. <i>This guy can <b>press</b> 300 pounds.</i>
<b>prevail upon</b>	Be valid, applicable, or true.
<b>produce</b>	Bring onto the market or release. <i>The tree would not <b>produce</b> fruit.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>Some regulation is still required to <b>promote</b> competition.</i>
<b>prompt</b>	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>And the picture he <b>prompted</b>.</i>
<b>result in</b>	Issue or terminate (in a specified way, state, etc.); end.
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She d just stay a few more minutes then <b>rouse</b> herself and go back.</i>

<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>As soon as the campaign started they <b>rushed</b> into action.</i>
<b>set in motion</b>	Set in type.
<b>spark off</b>	Emit or produce sparks.
<b>stimulate</b>	Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process). <i>This herbal infusion doesn't <b>stimulate</b>.</i>
<b>stir up</b>	Affect emotionally.
<b>trigger off</b>	Release or pull the trigger on.
<b>urge</b>	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>Drawing up outside the house he <b>urged</b> her inside.</i>

<b><u>entice</u></b>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>A show which should <b>entice</b> a new audience into the theatre.</i>
<b><u>excite</u></b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Gould was <b>excited</b> by these discoveries.</i>
<b><u>exhort</u></b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>I <b>exhorted</b> her to be a good child.</i>
<b>impel</b>	Drive, force, or urge (someone) to do something. <i>Vital energies <b>impel</b> him in unforeseen directions.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Encourage or stir up (violent or unlawful behaviour). <i>They conspired to <b>incite</b> riots.</i>
