- *The action or process of inducting someone to a post or organization.*
- *The production of an electric current in a conductor by varying the magnetic field applied to the conductor.*
- *Reasoning from detailed facts to general principles.*
- *An electrical phenomenon whereby an electromotive force (EMF) is generated in a closed circuit by a change in the flow of current.*
- *An act that sets in motion some course of events.*

- *Enlistment into military service.*
- *The production of an electric or magnetic state by the proximity (without contact) of an electrified or magnetized body.*
- *The production of facts to prove a general statement.*
- *The stage of the working cycle of an internal combustion engine in which the fuel mixture is drawn into the cylinders.*
- *A formal entry into an organization or position or office.*
- *The inference of a general law from particular instances.*
- *Stimulation that calls up (draws forth) a particular class of behaviors.*
- *The process of bringing on the birth of a baby by artificial means, typically by the use of drugs.*
- *The act of bringing about something (especially at an early time).*

<b>admittance</b>	The act of admitting someone to enter. <i>People were unable to gain <b>admittance</b> to the hall.</i>
<b>appearance</b>	A process of coming into existence or use. <i>She read it with every <b>appearance</b> of interest.</i>
<b><u>arrival</u></b>	The action or process of arriving. <i>The <b>arrival</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>beginning</b>	The background or origins of a person or organization. <i>He was responsible for the <b>beginning</b> of negotiations.</i>
<b><u>birth</u></b>	The process of giving birth. <i>Despite a difficult <b>birth</b> he s fit and healthy.</i>
<b>dawn</b>	The first appearance of light in the sky before sunrise. <i>He set off at <b>dawn</b>.</i>
<b><u>deduction</u></b>	The act of reducing the selling price of merchandise. <i>We do not yet know if these <b>deductions</b> are correct.</i>
<b>deriving</b>	(historical linguistics) an explanation of the historical origins of a word or phrase.
<b>drawing out</b>	Players buy (or are given) chances and prizes are distributed by casting lots.
<b>elicitation</b>	Stimulation that calls up (draws forth) a particular class of behaviors. <i>The <b>elicitation</b> of his testimony was not easy.</i>
<b><u>emergence</u></b>	The gradual beginning or coming forth. <i>Figurines presage the <b>emergence</b> of sculpture in Greece.</i>
<b>enlistment</b>	A period of time spent in military service. <i>The <b>enlistment</b> of students in the protests could lead to conflict.</i>
<b>enrolment</b>	The act of enrolling. <i><b>Enrolments</b> for teacher training have dropped off sharply.</i>
<b>eruption</b>	A sudden violent spontaneous occurrence (usually of some undesirable condition). <i>The <b>eruption</b> of Vesuvius.</i>
<b>evocation</b>	The action of eliciting a response. <i>His 560 page epic is a detailed moving <b>evocation</b> of childhood.</i>
<b><u>extraction</u></b>	The ethnic origin of someone's family. <i>A dental <b>extraction</b>.</i>

<b>first appearance</b>	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed at first of the bases in the infield (counting counterclockwise from home plate).
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b>generalisation</b>	(psychology) transfer of a response learned to one stimulus to a similar stimulus.
<b><u>generalization</u></b>	An idea or conclusion having general application. <i>He was making sweeping <b>generalizations</b>.</i>
<b>inauguration</b>	The ceremonial induction into a position. <i>The President's <b>inauguration</b>.</i>
<b><u>inception</u></b>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its <b>inception</b> two years ago.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	Including by incorporating. <i>The City Council opposed all new <b>incorporations</b>.</i>
<b>inductance</b>	A component with the property of inductance. <i>An <b>inductance</b> of 40 mH.</i>
<b>inference</b>	The reasoning involved in drawing a conclusion or making a logical judgment on the basis of circumstantial evidence and prior conclusions rather than on the basis of direct observation. <i>Researchers are entrusted with drawing <b>inferences</b> from the data.</i>
<b><u>initiation</u></b>	Wisdom as evidenced by the possession of knowledge. <i>An <b>initiation</b> ceremony.</i>
<b>installation</b>	A large piece of equipment installed for use. <i>A video <b>installation</b>.</i>
<b>introduction</b>	The act of starting something for the first time; introducing something new. <i>Despite the new <b>introductions</b> many of the older species remain firm favourites.</i>
<b>investiture</b>	The action of formally investing a person with honours or rank. <i>The <b>investiture</b> of bishops.</i>
<b>investment</b>	The ceremonial act of clothing someone in the insignia of an office; the formal promotion of a person to an office or rank. <i>This job calls for the <b>investment</b> of some hard thinking.</i>
<b><u>onset</u></b>	(military) an offensive against an enemy (using weapons). <i>The <b>onset</b> of winter.</i>

**ordination** A statistical technique in which data from a large number of sites or populations are represented as points in a multidimensional space.  
*The rabbi's family was present for his **ordination**.*

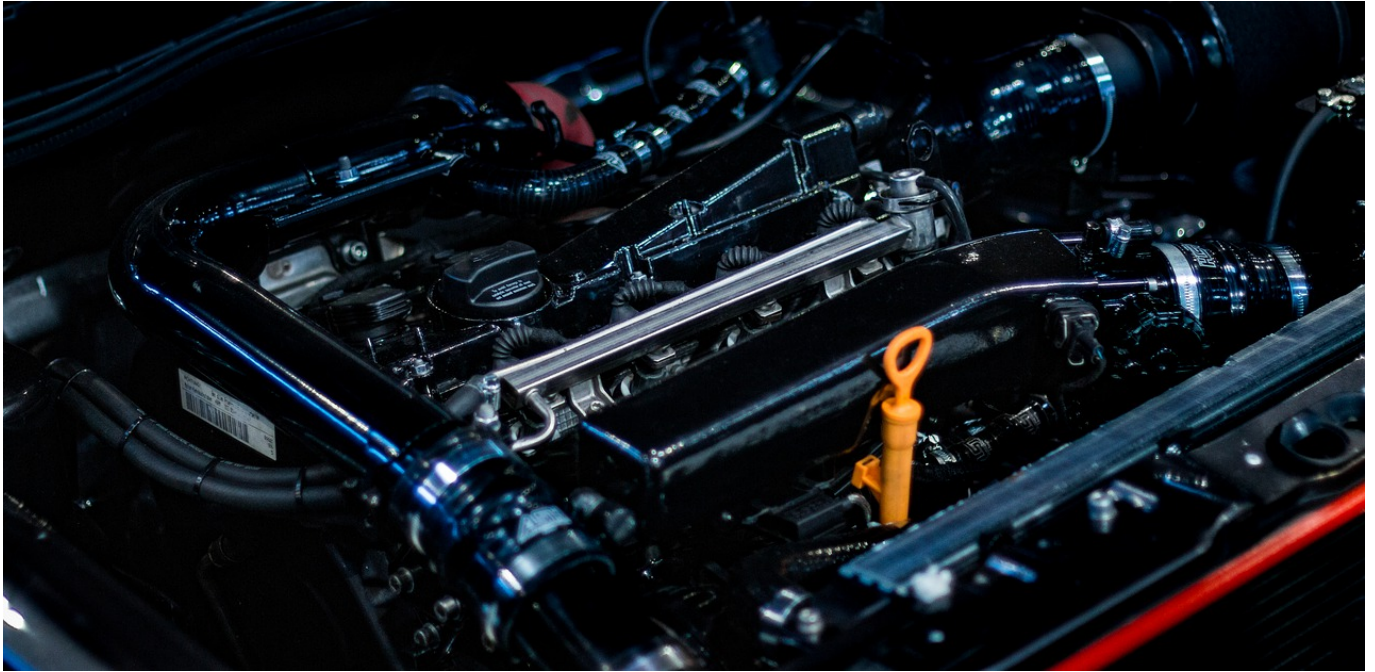
**recruitment** The action of enlisting new people in the armed forces.  
*The black tailed deer is notoriously capable of population **recruitment** after numbers are depleted.*

**trigger** A small device that releases a spring or catch and so sets off a mechanism, especially in order to fire a gun.  
*He pulled the **trigger** of the shotgun.*

<b>alcove</b>	A recess in the wall of a room or garden.
<b>amenity</b>	Pleasantness resulting from agreeable conditions. <i>Developments which would clash with <b>amenity</b>.</i>
<b>anode</b>	The negatively charged electrode of an electrical device, such as a primary cell, that supplies current.
<b>attraction</b>	A force under the influence of which objects tend to move towards each other. <i>She has very romantic ideas about sexual <b>attraction</b>.</i>
<b>ceremony</b>	A formal religious or public occasion, especially one celebrating a particular event, achievement, or anniversary. <i>The winners were presented with their prizes at a special <b>ceremony</b>.</i>
<b>conductor</b>	A device designed to transmit electricity, heat, etc. <i>Most polymers are poor <b>conductors</b>.</i>
<b>convenience</b>	A device or control that is very useful for a particular job. <i>Services should be run to suit the <b>convenience</b> of customers not of staff.</i>
<b>database</b>	An organized body of related information. <i>A <b>database</b> covering nine million workers.</i>
<b>educational</b>	Relating to the provision of education. <i>Children with special <b>educational</b> needs.</i>

<b>electrical</b>	Of a company or shop manufacturing or selling electrical appliances. <i>An <b>electrical</b> storm.</i>
<b>electricity</b>	Energy made available by the flow of electric charge through a conductor. <i>The <b>electricity</b> was back on.</i>
<b>electrode</b>	A conductor through which electricity enters or leaves an object, substance, or region.
<b>energy</b>	Physics a thermodynamic quantity equivalent to the capacity of a physical system to do work the units of energy are joules or ergs. <i>His writing conveys great <b>energy</b>.</i>
<b><u>engineering</u></b>	A room (as on a ship) in which the engine is located. <i>He had trouble deciding which branch of <b>engineering</b> to study.</i>
<b>ergonomics</b>	The study of people's efficiency in their working environment.
<b>facility</b>	A building or place that provides a particular service or is used for a particular industry. <i>He had a <b>facility</b> for languages.</i>
<b>galvanism</b>	The therapeutic use of electric currents.
<b>hospice</b>	A program of medical and emotional care for the terminally ill. <i><b>Hospice</b> workers.</i>
<b>installation</b>	A formal entry into an organization or position or office. <i>Computer <b>installations</b>.</i>
<b>insulation</b>	The state of being isolated or detached. <i>Keep your home warmer through <b>insulation</b>.</i>
<b>machinery</b>	Machines or machine systems collectively. <i>The complex <b>machinery</b> of negotiation.</i>
<b>orphanage</b>	The condition of being a child without living parents. <i>His early <b>orphanage</b> shaped his character as an adult.</i>
<b>program</b>	Write a computer program. <i>You can't tell the players without a <b>program</b>.</i>
<b>removal</b>	Dismissal from office. <i><b>Removal</b> men.</i>
<b>semiconductor</b>	A solid substance that has a conductivity between that of an insulator and that of most metals either due to the addition of an impurity or because of temperature effects Devices made of semiconductors notably silicon are essential components of most electronic circuits.
<b>server</b>	A computer or computer program which manages access to a centralized resource or service in a network. <i>The software runs on a variety of Unix <b>servers</b>.</i>

- software** (computer science) written programs or procedures or rules and associated documentation pertaining to the operation of a computer system and that are stored in read/write memory.  
*The **software** industry.*
- spreadsheet** A computer program used to create and manipulate spreadsheets.  
*William spent most of the day updating the Risk Assessment **spreadsheet**.*
- substation** A small post office, for example one situated within a larger shop.
- training** The result of good upbringing (especially knowledge of correct social behavior).  
*You ll have to go into strict **training**.*
