amateurish	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>A very amateurish job.</i>
awkward	Causing or feeling uneasy embarrassment or inconvenience. <i>Luther s awkward movements impeded his progress.</i>
cumbersome	Not elegant or graceful in expression. <i>Organizations with cumbersome hierarchical structures.</i>

<u>deficient</u>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i>Deficient in common sense.</i>
<u>disorganized</u>	Lacking order or methodical arrangement or function. <i>She s very muddled and disorganized.</i>
<u>incapable</u>	(followed by `of') lacking capacity or ability. <i>Incapable of doing the work.</i>
incompetent	Not qualified to act in a particular capacity. <i>Incompetent at chess.</i>
<u>ineffective</u>	Not producing an intended effect. <i>An ineffective teacher.</i>
<u>ineffectual</u>	Lacking in power or forcefulness. <i>An ineffectual ruler.</i>
inefficacious	Lacking the power to produce a desired effect. <i>Social conventions honed over thousands of years were suddenly inefficacious.</i>
inept	Revealing lack of perceptiveness or judgment or finesse. <i>The referee s inept handling of the match.</i>
inexpert	Having or showing a lack of skill or knowledge. <i>An inexpert transcription from the real music.</i>
purposeless	Having no aim or plan. <i>His purposeless life.</i>
slow	At a slow tempo. <i>Business is dull or slow.</i>
slow-moving	Moving slowly.
uneconomical	Wasteful of money or other resources; not economical. <i>The old buses eventually become uneconomical to run.</i>
<u>unfit</u>	(of a thing) not of the necessary quality or standard to meet a particular purpose. <i>Fat and very unfit.</i>
<u>unproductive</u>	Not producing or able to produce large amounts of goods, crops, or other commodities. <i>Unproductive meetings.</i>
unskilful	Not having or showing skill. <i>Though kind and willing she was unskilful.</i>
<u>unskilled</u>	Not having or requiring special skill or training. <i>Unskilled workmanship.</i>

<u>unsuitable</u>	Not capable of being applied. <i>A solvent unsuitable for use on wood surfaces.</i>
unsystematic	Lacking systematic arrangement or method or organization. <i>The burial mound was excavated in an unsystematic way.</i>
unwieldy	Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape. <i>Huge unwieldy arc lamps.</i>
<u>wasteful</u>	Tending to squander and waste. <i>When wasteful war shall statues overturn.</i>

<u>costly</u>	Entailing great loss or sacrifice. <i>Costly jewelry.</i>
deluxe	Ostentatiously rich and superior in quality. <i>A deluxe hotel.</i>
dissipation	Loss of energy through its conversion into heat. <i>Energy dissipation.</i>
expendable	(used of funds) remaining after taxes. <i>The region is expendable in the wider context of national politics.</i>
<u>expensive</u>	Costing a lot of money. <i>Keeping a horse is expensive.</i>

extravagance	The quality of exceeding the appropriate limits of decorum or probability or truth. <i>His reckless extravagance with other people's money.</i>
extravagant	Exceeding what is reasonable or appropriate; excessive or elaborate. <i>Extravagant claims about the merchandise.</i>
fling	The act of flinging. <i>One final fling before a tranquil retirement.</i>
garbage	Rubbish or waste, especially domestic refuse. <i>Garbage littered the estate.</i>
ineffective	Lacking in power or forcefulness. <i>An ineffective administration.</i>
inefficiency	The state of not achieving maximum productivity; failure to make the best use of time or resources. <i>The idea is to eliminate inefficiency creating a seamless manufacturing process.</i>
lavish	Sumptuously rich, elaborate, or luxurious. <i>Lavish praise.</i>
luxury	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. <i>Luxury goods.</i>
million	(in Roman numerals, M written with a macron over it) denoting a quantity consisting of 1,000,000 items or units. <i>There were millions of flies.</i>
outlay	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>Comparatively little financial outlay.</i>
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The dessert was prodigal with whipped cream.</i>
prodigality	The trait of spending extravagantly.
profligacy	Reckless extravagance or wastefulness in the use of resources. <i>An era of extreme decadence and profligacy.</i>
profligate	Licentious; dissolute. <i>He is a drunkard and a profligate.</i>
slow	Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or to prevent competitors from travelling fast. <i>Investment has slowed down.</i>
spending	The act of spending or disbursing money.

spendthrift	Someone who spends money prodigally. <i>Putt was a spendthrift and a heavy gambler.</i>
splurge	A large or excessive amount of something. <i>I splurged on a new TV.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>A life characterized by thriftlessness and waste.</i>
wastebasket	A container with an open top; for discarded paper and other rubbish.
<u>wasteful</u>	Inefficient in use of time and effort and materials. <i>A clumsy and wasteful process.</i>
<u>wastrel</u>	Someone who dissipates resources self-indulgently. <i>I have no intention of seeing my dues gambled away by your wastrel of a son.</i>
