ineffectual Lacking in power or forcefulness.

An **ineffectual** ruler.

Lacking the power to produce a desired effect.

inefficacious Social conventions honed over thousands of years were suddenly

inefficacious.

Revealing lack of perceptiveness or judgment or finesse.

The referee s **inept** handling of the match.

inexpert Having or showing a lack of skill or knowledge.

An **inexpert** transcription from the real music.

purposeless Having no aim or plan. His **purposeless** life.

At a slow tempo.

Business is dull or **slow**.

slow-moving Moving slowly.

uneconomical Wasteful of money or other resources; not economical.

The old buses eventually become **uneconomical** to run.

(of a thing) not of the necessary quality or standard to meet a particular

unfit purpose.

Fat and very **unfit**.

Not producing or able to produce large amounts of goods, crops, or other

unproductive commodities.

Unproductive meetings.

unskilful Not having or showing skill.

Though kind and willing she was **unskilful**.

Not having or requiring special skill or training.

Unskilled workmanship.



unsuitable Not capable of being applied.

A solvent **unsuitable** for use on wood surfaces.

unsystematic Lacking systematic arrangement or method or organization.

The burial mound was excavated in an **unsystematic** way.

unwieldy Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape.

Huge **unwieldy** arc lamps.

wasteful Tending to squander and waste.

When **wasteful** war shall statues overturn.
