by force of circumstance In reserve; not for immediate use.		
<u>certainly</u>	Used to emphasize the speaker's belief that what is said is true. <i>She</i> <b>certainly</b> <i>is a hard worker</i> .	
definitely	Without question and beyond doubt. I shall <b>definitely</b> be at the airport to meet you.	
incontrovertibly	In an obvious and provable manner.	
ineluctably	By necessity.	
inescapably	In a way that cannot be avoided or ignored; undeniably. The situation slid <b>inescapably</b> toward disaster.	
<u>naturally</u>	In a normal manner; without exaggeration or effort. <i>He was <b>naturally</b> lazy.</i>	
<u>necessarily</u>	As a highly likely consequence. The prognosis can <b>necessarily</b> be only an educated guess.	
needs	Of necessity. We must <b>needs</b> by objective.	
<u>surely</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>The results are <b>surely</b> encouraging.</i>	
unavoidably	In a way that cannot be avoided, prevented, or ignored. The book becomes perhaps <b>unavoidably</b> slightly repetitive.	
<u>undoubtedly</u>	Without doubt; certainly. They are <b>undoubtedly</b> guilty.

meaningful	Communicating something that is not directly expressed. A <i>meaningful</i> explanation.
<u>must</u>	Be obliged to; should (expressing necessity. You <b>must</b> try some of this fish.
<u>necessarily</u>	In an essential manner. Such expenses are <b>necessarily</b> incurred.
necessary	(of a concept, statement, etc.) inevitably resulting from the nature of things, so that the contrary is impossible. The <b>necessary</b> consequences of one s actions.
necessity	A situation enforcing a certain course of action. A good book is a <b>necessity</b> when travelling.
need	Have need of. Lest you even more than <b>need</b> s embitter our parting.
needs	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. We must <b>needs</b> by objective.
obligate	Require or compel (someone) to undertake a legal or moral duty. The money must be <b>obligate</b> d within 30 days.
obligatory	Morally or legally constraining or binding. <i>He made all the <b>obligatory</b> apologies.</i>
