**competitive**

Involving competition or competitiveness.  
*A car industry **competitive** with any in the world.*

**cut-price**

Costing less than standard price.

**cut-rate**

Costing less than standard price.

<b>economic</b>	Of or relating to the science of economics. <i>Have to keep prices high enough to make it <b>economic</b> to continue the service.</i>
<b>economical</b>	Using no more of something than is necessary. <i>He was <b>economical</b> in all areas of life.</i>
<b>giveaway</b>	(of prices) very low. <i>Small <b>giveaway</b> mannerisms.</i>
<b>keenly priced</b>	Very good.
<b>low-cost</b>	That you have the financial means for.
<b>low-priced</b>	That you have the financial means for.
<b>marked down</b>	Strongly marked; easily noticeable.
<b>on special offer</b>	First and most important.
<b>reasonable</b>	Based on good sense. <i>Man is by nature <b>reasonable</b>.</i>
<b>reduced</b>	Well below normal (especially in price).
<b>rock-bottom</b>	Well below normal (especially in price).

<b><u>affordable</u></b>	That you have the financial means for. <i><b>Affordable</b> homes.</i>
<b><u>bargain</u></b>	Be prepared for; expect. <i>He made a <b>bargain</b> with the devil.</i>
<b>chaffer</b>	Haggling about the price of something. <i>I <b>chaffer</b>ed in the bazaars for objects I wanted.</i>
<b>cheap</b>	Of very poor quality; flimsy. <i>A <b>cheap</b> trick.</i>
<b>cheaply</b>	In a stingy manner. <i>Some people forgive too <b>cheaply</b>.</i>
<b>coupon</b>	Of a consumer collect and use coupons or vouchers offering discounts on goods or services. <i>The stock carries a 10 per cent <b>coupon</b>.</i>

<b>discount</b>	Interest on an annual basis deducted in advance on a loan. <i>Rail commuters get a <b>discount</b> on season tickets.</i>
<b>economical</b>	Giving good value or return in relation to the money, time, or effort expended. <i>A small <b>economical</b> car.</i>
<b>frugal</b>	Avoiding waste. <i>I m a bit too <b>frugal</b> to splash out on designer clothes.</i>
<b>gratis</b>	Without charge; free. <i>A monthly programme was issued <b>gratis</b>.</i>
<b>haggle</b>	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining). <i>Let s not <b>haggle</b> over a few dollars.</i>
<b>meagerly</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>These voices are <b>meagerly</b> represented at the conference.</i>
<b>miser</b>	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical <b>miser</b> he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
<b>parsimony</b>	Extreme stinginess. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government <b>parsimony</b>.</i>
<b>rebate</b>	Pay back a sum of money as a rebate. <i>The scheme eases the move to the council tax by giving <b>rebates</b> in the first year.</i>
<b>redemptive</b>	Acting to save someone from error or evil. <i><b>Redemptive</b> or redeeming love.</i>
<b>rescue</b>	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>Firemen <b>rescued</b> a man trapped in the river.</i>
<b>save</b>	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>The statement was made to <b>save</b> the government some embarrassment.</i>
<b>saving</b>	An economy of or reduction in money, time, or another resource. <i>Innovative money <b>saving</b> ideas for students.</i>
<b>schlock</b>	Merchandise that is shoddy or inferior. <i>Mass produced <b>schlock</b>.</i>
<b>scrimp</b>	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>Scratch and <b>scrimp</b>.</i>
<b>shoddy</b>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i><b>Shoddy</b> business practices.</i>
<b>skimp</b>	Limit in quality or quantity. <i>She wore a yellow <b>skimp</b>.</i>

<b>sparing</b>	Avoiding waste. <i><b>Sparing</b> in their use of heat and light.</i>
<b>sparingly</b>	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used <b>sparingly</b>.</i>
<b>tacky</b>	(of a glutinous liquid such as paint) not completely dried and slightly sticky to the touch. <i>The paint was still <b>tacky</b>.</i>
<b>thrift</b>	The quality of using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>The values of <b>thrift</b> and self reliance.</i>
<b>thrifty</b>	Prosperous. <i>He had been brought up to be <b>thrifty</b> and careful.</i>
<b>tightwad</b>	A mean or miserly person. <i>He is a notorious <b>tightwad</b>.</i>
